MAY TRY BREEDING ALASKA CHICKENS

A Medford poultry fancier, who has become interested in the Alaskan breed, has written to Nome, Alaska, for information regarding the Alaskan chickens. These chickens, instead of possessing feathers, are covered with a downy fur.

These Alaskan chickens lay better in the winter than in the summer, and are said to set the year around. The egg is different from that of other breeds. It is as large, but is slightly elongated and possesses a very thick shell.

The meat, instead of being brown and white, is black and red. Instead of a comb, the chicken has a furry crest like a hood. Its feet are webbed as it is sometimes compelled to swim and the fur on the legs is thick and like felt.

1673 REGISTER FOR CITY ELECTION JANUARY 13

When the registration books closed Wednesday night 1673 voters had enrolled. Of these 453 were women and 1,620 men. The falling off in women registration is generally credited to the distraction of Christmas shopping.

This number is about 600 short of the registration a year ago, when W. W. Effert was elected. Those voters who did not register can cast a ballot on election day by swearing in their votes with three freeholders before the registration board or with six freeholders before the election board.

Biggest Pontoon Bridge

PRAIRIE DU CHIEN, Wis., Dec. 26.—The final touches are today being put upon the largest pontoon bridge in the country, which when launched will span the east channel of the Mississippi river here. The big boat weighs 3058 tons and is 210 feet long.

ROGUE RIVER IN FINE FINANCIAL SHAPESAYS MAYOR

E. R. Rosser, mayor of Rogue River, has filed his biennial report for the two years ending this month. It shows receipts of \$6317 of which \$3528 was from taxes, \$2440 from liquor licenses, \$108 from pool, dog and show licenses, \$90 from fines, \$58 from pound fees.

In addition the mayor remarks: The receipts and disbursements of the water department have been kept separate from the other funds. The water system cost approximately \$12,000. The funds were derived from the sale of \$10,000 bond issue which was authorized by the voters on August 15, 1911.

We are indebted to the citizens of town for a contribution of \$71.50 toward the cost of the band stand and to members of the band for a portion of the labor. We are indebted to the ladies of the Rogue River Improvement club for the drinking fountain installed in front of the band stand.

There has been constructed 1930 lineal feet of concrete sidewalk. This has been done by the owners of the property adjoining. A franchise has been granted to the Home Telephone & Telegraph company. This company is now making preparations to remove all poles from the principal streets to the alleys and place a portion of the overhead wires in cables.

Aside from warrants outstanding against the water fund, which I have mentioned above, there has been a warrant issued for \$1327 for hope and reels and other fire equipment. This stands as a debt against the general fund at this time.

I bespeak for the coming council your hearty co-operation. They have accepted the office to which they are elected under protest. You will find that they are able to give you much better service if they have your support in anything that they may undertake.

HIGHER PRICES FOR APPLES IN LONDON

Dennis & Sons report under date of December 6th: London. Apples. Barreled apples are in rather better supply this week, arrivals totaling 5000 upwards, exclusive of Nova Scotian stock, of which the s.s. "Almeriana" brought 12,5000 barrels. The arrivals were in fairly good condition as regards the bulk of the fruit, although some parcels of Maine fruit showed waste, as also did some of the Canadian barrels. It will there be seen that London is a strong market on barrel stocks at the present time, and our judgment of the outlook last week has been fully justified.

The situation on Oregon Newtowns is now stronger. Arrivals are only moderate, but there were considerable stocks on hand, which have, however, been liquidated during the week. Prices for good-colored fruit of best quality range from 19s for the large fruit up to 52s 6d for the medium and smaller-size fruit. These Oregon are now coloring up nicely, and the extreme greenness which we remarked in earlier arrivals is not now so much in evidence.

Spitzenbergs and Jonathans, small fruit, meet with a ready sale at around 11s, but the smaller counts are slow at 9s. 10s. As regards the general situation, we look for a continuance of the present good demand until the market closes for the Christmas vacation, and for even higher prices if supplies drop off again, as appears only too likely in view of the tendency shown the other side to hold them up.

Barrel Pears. Kellers are in light supply and a large proportion of these are again showing waste and rotten fruit. For some medium sized fruit, tight barrels, we realized 22s to 25s per barrel. Some first quality good hard fruit would do well. Cases. Winter Nellis pears show a set back this week, due to arrivals showing up in over-ripe condition.
