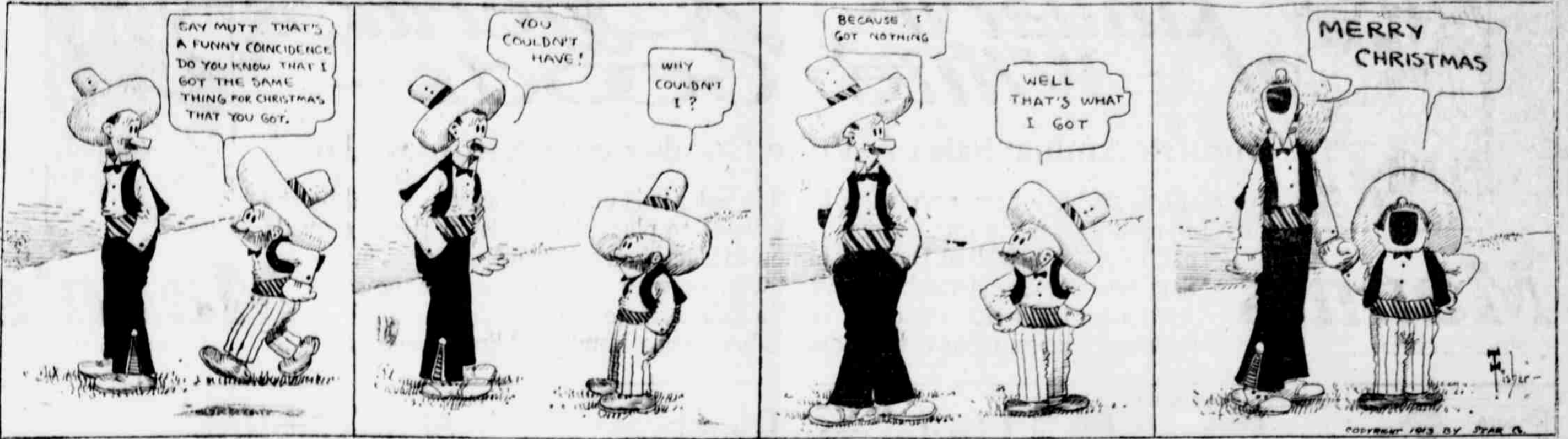


Christmas Comes but Once a Year
