

## FOURTH ANNUAL TRIAL OF DR. HYDE BEGINS

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Jan. 5.—The fourth annual trial of Dr. Clark Hyde for the murder of millionaire Thomas H. Swope, of Independence, was scheduled to begin here today before Judge E. E. Porterfield, in the criminal court. This trial promised to differ from the others in that United States Senator James A. Reed is not assisting the prosecution. Reed officiated three times.

Hyde, a prominent physician who married the niece of Swope, was indicted for killing the eccentric millionaire, his cousin and nephew with cyanide of potassium and with poisonings the whole Swope family, their servants and friends visiting in the house, with typhus germs injected in their food, milk and drinking water. In the first trial Hyde was convicted. The Missouri supreme court reversed and remanded the case, affirming more than 50 errors alleged by the defense and scorning the prosecution and presiding judge. The next trial a juror went insane and climbed out the transom. A mistrial was declared. On the third trial, the jury disagreed and another trial was ordered.

### STEAMER BREAKWATER ARRIVES AT PORTLAND

PORLTAND, Or., Jan. 5.—The steamer Breakwater, wild rumors of whose sinking were rife along the Oregon coast late Saturday night, arrived safely in the lower harbor and docked about midnight.

"The voyage from Marshfield to Astoria was without incident, although the sea was very heavy," said Captain MacLean.

## FEDERAL EFFORT TO SMASH EGG TRUST

CHICAGO, Jan. 5.—The government's final effort to smash the alleged butter and egg "trusts" and prevent forever the formation of pools to boost prices began before Federal Judge Landis today.

Backed by the report of Master in Chancery A. B. Morrison, District Attorney Wilkerson began arguments asking for the dissolution of the butter and egg boards of Chicago and Elgin. If the claims of the government are allowed, the big butter and egg men will be practically enjoined from acting in concert to fix prices, regulate the operations in the market or in any way co-operate for their mutual profit against the public interests.

### WAVES SWEEP AWAY SUMMER RESORT

HOQUIAM, Wash., Jan. 5.—Where Moelips was, there are only mountainous waves today. The big hotel, which, with its surrounding

cottages, made Moelips a resort visited by thousands every summer, has been washed away and but for the wreckage thrown about by incoming and receding waves, the Moelips townsite differs in no way from the miles of beach north and south.

The cottages went in a storm six weeks ago. The high winds of the past three days, drove the waves higher up the beach, and the hotel, gradually undermined, finally collapsed some time Saturday or Sunday.

Receipts were light and Monday's run was the smallest in months, but eleven loads came into the open market Friday and tops moved freely at 8 cents.

The sheep house filled up early in the week, but has been depleted since. Fancy lambs selling at \$6.35 featured. Mutton business was temporarily dull, due to short receipts.

Generally, sheep and lambs, hogs and cattle are off on a steady basis to commence the new year.

The cattle trade has been showing considerable strength recently, as killers have been busy clearing up their December surplus. The demand for beef is not strong enough, however, to elevate prices on poor stuff, and only the prices of grades have advanced. Best steers sold from \$7.75 to \$8.10 with the bulk at about \$7.75 to \$7.90. Butcher stock had a slow time, as supply contained very little choice material. Cows at \$6.30, heifers \$7.00, bulls \$5.50 to \$7.50 and calves \$7.50 to \$9.00 are top quotations.
