THOUSANDS COME FOR JOBS WITH FORD COMPANY

DETROIT, Mich., Jan. 7.—Thousands of unemployed men from the middle west arrived here today in search of jobs at the Ford Motor company's factory here, which recently announced a profit-sharing plan by which its employees would receive a minimum wage of \$3 daily. "No jobs given out today," was a sign displayed conspicuously by Ford officials. The police had advised the company to withhold all jobs for one week, fearing if the positions were given out at this time that the mob would rush the doors of the plant and fight for places in line. President Ford was swamped today with messages of congratulation from all parts of the country. Many other factories have wired him asking for details of the profit-sharing plan.
