MEXICAN REBELS AGAIN CLOSE IN

PRESIDIO, Texas. Jan. 7 .- The rebels had closed in on Ojinaga todays. They did it during the night and so swiftly that several scouting parties only a short distance outside the entrenchments could not get

The rebels resumed the agressive on General Herrera's arrival with 2000 men to reinforce General Ortega's little army. Herrera brought several cannon and much ammunition. At dawn the cordon about Ojinaga was once more tightly drawn. and heavy firing had begun. A rumor was current that General Villa had reached the battlefield, but this was not confirmed.

It was estimated that 750 had been killed in the fighting up to today, of whom 300 were of the town's defenders. The news also reached here that 45 rebel prisoners were put to death in Ofinaga Monday and eighteen yesterday. This did not include the seriously wounded rebels who were "put out of their misery." BAKER COUNTY as a wounded officer of the garrison expressed it here, by parties sent out to pick up the dead on the field.

One hundred members of the Ojinaga garrison and sixty-two rebels were in hospitals here today. The smallpox situation in Ojinaga, according to refugees from there, was improving, the disease not having spread as rapidly as was feared.

HOME IS SWEPT DOWN BLUFF BY SLIDE; BABE KILLED

SEATTLE, Wash, Jan. 7 .- Baby Booth, three years old, was killed and six other members of the family of Simon Booth, were injured when their home on the bluff of Alki avenue, near Fairmout avenue. West Seattle, was swept twenty-five feet down the bank by an earthslide late yesterday afternoon.

When the house commenced to rock, Mrs. Booth seized the baby and attempted to leave by a rear door. A storm of rain and mud forced her back into the room. The babs was caught against a piece of furni-

ture and killed. Mrs. Booth fell through a hole in the floor as the sliding house was wrenched apart and sank in the mud. It took the combined efforts of several neighbors of the family fiftyfive minutes to extricate her.

For more than half an hour the mud and water continued to rise. and reached a level with Mrs. Booth'. chin. As fast as the rescuers removed the mud it would rush back again. Booth threw his daughter Catherine, four years of age, out of the door to safety, when, attracted by the cries of his wife he started to rescue her, but his legs were pinioned by two sills and he was held prisoner

None of the survivors were ser lously injured.
