(Continued from page 1.) points near the scene of the disaster said that thousands had been driven from their homes with only the clothing they wore. The people of the section were doing their utmost to care for them but the magnitude of the catastrophe was such that they were completely swamped and wholesale deaths from starvation threatened.

The well-to-do as well as the poor lost their all in the general destruction and families which hitherto have known only luxury found themselves reduced overnight to absolute destitution.

Kagoshima was the home of many Japanese of prominence, including generals, statesmen and captains of industry. Few of them had been heard from and the greatest anxiety was felt concerning their fate.

JOHNSON MATCHED TO FIGHT MORAN

PARIS, Jan. 14.—Jack Johnson and Frank Moran of Pittsburg at noon here today signed for a twenty round championship bout to be staged in Paris in June. The exact date will be announced later. Johnson is given a flat guarantee of \$20,000 and allowed \$5000 for training expenses.

Moran and the negro met yesterday. They were to have signed articles then but Johnson suddenly remembered that it was the 13th of the month and insisted that the signing be postponed twenty-four hours.
