DELUGE OF CATTLE SEND PRICES DOWN

PORTLAND, Jan. 19.—Receipts for the week have been: Cattle, 1755; calves, 11; hogs, 6742; sheep, 8195.

That cattle prices did not break badly and cause a panic this week is the remarkable feature to the trade. Following the depression a week ago, Monday came forth with a veritable deluge of cattle and buyers prevented disaster by cleaning up the supply and relieving the congestion.

Hog trade was steady to firm during the entire period. Monday's run broke all records, the total being 2950 head. Receipts during the other four days added approximately 4000 more.

Mutton and lamb markets have maintained former price levels easily, especially for the choice grain-fed varieties. Prime wethers sold at \$5.75 and ewes at \$4.50, but medium quality was cut sharply.

KLAMATH FALLS WINS DEBATE FROM ASHLAND

KLAMATH FALLS, Jan. 19.—The Klamath county high school has won the championship of the Southern Oregon division of the Oregon High School Debating League, by defeating the debating team from the Ashland high school.

Word has just been received at the local headquarters of the Crater Lake national forest that the secretary of agriculture has recommended that 40 acres in township 33 south, range 19 west, Willamette Meridian, be opened to entry under the forest homestead act.

A SOUTHERN PACIFIC OPPORTUNITY

IN his annual report, Secretary Franklin K. Lane of the department of the interior advocates the creation of a bureau of national parks to control the nation's playgrounds.

Some idea of the importance of the parks and what they mean in an economic way is shown by the financial reports of concessions in three of the larger parks, to-wit, the Yellowstone, where receipts for 1912 total \$1,067,161.34, as against \$1,050,039 for 1911; the Yosemite, \$311,444.32 for 1912, as against \$295,500 for 1911; and the Mt. Rainier, \$56,735.93 for 1912—exclusive of money spent in railroad fare or traveling expenses to the parks.

With proper facilities at the Crater Lake park, with the system of highways now under construction completed and adequate highways connecting therewith, with the park advertised by the railroads, the receipts at the park should approximate a million dollars a year, with another million spent at Medford and Klamath Falls by tourists.

It can readily be seen that Crater Lake is one of the great resources of the state, that, properly developed and exploited, it can be made a great income producer and a source of constantly increasing wealth.

During the past year the total number of visitors to all the parks aggregated 251,703, as against 229,084 in 1912, 224,000 in 1911, and 198,506 in 1910. Secretary Lane says that travel to the parks will doubtless be greatly augmented hereafter, particularly during 1915, when the Panama-Pacific international exposition will be held in San Francisco, at which time the various transcontinental railroads will doubtless provide a transportation rate calculated to attract tourists to these parks, as well as to the exposition.

If the Southern Pacific would take hold of the Crater Lake park with the same spirit as the Great Northern has of the Glacier park, or the Northern Pacific has the Yellowstone, it would be but a few years until 50,000 persons a year visited the park. This is the Southern Pacific's opportunity.
