SCHWERIN BEFORE FEDERAL GRAND JURY

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Jan. 20.—R. P. Schwerin, vice-president and general manager of the Pacific Mail Steamship company, was scheduled to testify this afternoon before the federal grand jury. He will be called when that body meets late today.

Schwerin will be asked about an alleged collision between officials of his company, certain former customs officials and the Western Fuel defendants, to defraud the government. Government Prosecutor Theodore O'Rehe announced that he would inform Schwerin that whatever testimony he may give will not render him immune from prosecution, if it is found that he has been culpable.

Another indication that the Clarks have not forgotten the part played in bringing about President Wilson's nomination in the Baltimore convention came when Miss Genevieve Clark indicated that she did not desire an invitation to the dinner which Secretary Bryan gave to the diplomatic corps and house foreign committee last Saturday night.

The city of Medford purchased 670 gallons of gasoline in the period between July 11 and December 31, 1913, according to the report of Fire Chief Eugene Amann to be read by the city council tonight. Of the total amount, 335 gallons were used by the autos of the water department and 30 gallons by the fire department. The engineer's department required 140 gallons of gasoline, the police department 89 gallons, and the plumbing inspector 20 gallons.

The loss by fire during 1913 above insurance was \$5593. The fire losses during the year was \$16,395, covered by insurance to the amount of \$10,932. Fifty-five alarms were answered, fifteen more than in 1912. In going to and from fires 59 miles were covered and 14,300 feet of hose laid, and 560 gallons of chemicals used. The department has 4100 feet of hose, 3500 feet of which is listed as being in good shape.

Defective flues caused 15 alarms and grass in vacant lots 12. A dozen residences were endangered by flames. The others are listed as follows: Garage, livery barn, woodsheds false alarms, cleaning works, woodpile, stores, club rooms, outside city.

The cost of maintaining the fire department was \$6814.74, and of this \$5400 was for the salaries of six men. Vacation cost the city \$195.75. The telephone bill was \$192.
