

### EMERICK ELECTED PRESIDENT OF NEW CITY COUNCIL

The new city council met Tuesday night in a short and harmonious session, electing V. J. Emerick of the second ward president of the council, and transacting little business indicative of their future policy.

The most important business was the naming of the committees for the year by Mayor Purdin as follows:

Finance—Medynski, Sargent, Hargrave.

Streets and roads—Sargent, Medynski, Emerick.

Light and water—Porter, Emerick, Miles.

Licenses—Purdin, Emerick, Porter.

Building fire—Miles, Medynski, Hargrave.

Health—Hargrave, Sargent, Purdin.

(First named, chairman.)

The only flurry of the session came when Councilman Sargent of the second ward announced that if the Holland hotel was not running at the end of six months he would vote to deny a liquor license, in accordance with the unwritten law that no saloons be allowed off Front street, except in hotels. Councilman Emerick said he thought it would be running as such long before that time.

Matters concerning paving were disposed of by the city council last night, the bid of Schell & Schell for \$8750 worth of bonds on the Vancouver avenue at par and accrued interest was accepted.

Upon motion of Councilman Porter, the claim of the P. & E. railroad for \$6.55 pavement over assessments was allowed. The bill of the Warren Construction company for \$800 for keeping the Main street pavement in repair was referred to the finance committee for action.

The lost water certificate of A. W. Stone, which has been hobbing up from time to time, was referred to the next meeting. The council is not adverse to mending Mr. Stone's loss, but fears it will set a precedent in the matter of lost certificates.

The controversy over the Riverside avenue sewer assessment (district 13) was referred until the next meeting.

### SEEK GOVERNMENT MINING STATION FOR GRANTS PASS

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 21.—Congressman Hawley has been working to have a mining experiment station established at Grants Pass, Ore., to assist the miners of southern Oregon in their industry, which has become one of the most important industries in the state. He has a bill pending in the house, proposing the establishment of such a station, under the management and control of the bureau of mines, but with a mining engineer in charge at a salary of \$4000 per annum, a metallurgical chemist at a salary of \$3000 per annum and an assistant at \$2000. It is proposed that \$25,000 also be appropriated to establish, equip and maintain the laboratory or experiment station.

Mr. Hawley is also endeavoring to secure the mapping of the Dothan Quadrangle during the coming season, and has recently had this matter up with the director of the United States geological survey. The director advises Mr. Hawley that the same will receive his careful consideration and he hopes to have the co-operation of the state of Oregon and of the United States forest service in making the survey. Congressman Hawley has taken the matter up with the Grants Pass commercial club and the state engineer of Oregon and believes that he will secure the co-operation of all persons interested.

The Dothan quadrangle contains some of the best mining country in the state. According to a statement issued by the geological survey on January 5, Josephine county leads every other part of the state of Oregon in the output of placer gold for the year just closed. The mines of Oregon made a large and unexpected increase in gold yield during 1913, compared with 1912, and Mr. Hawley thinks that this industry should be encouraged as much as possible and the lot of the miner made as encouraging as possible.

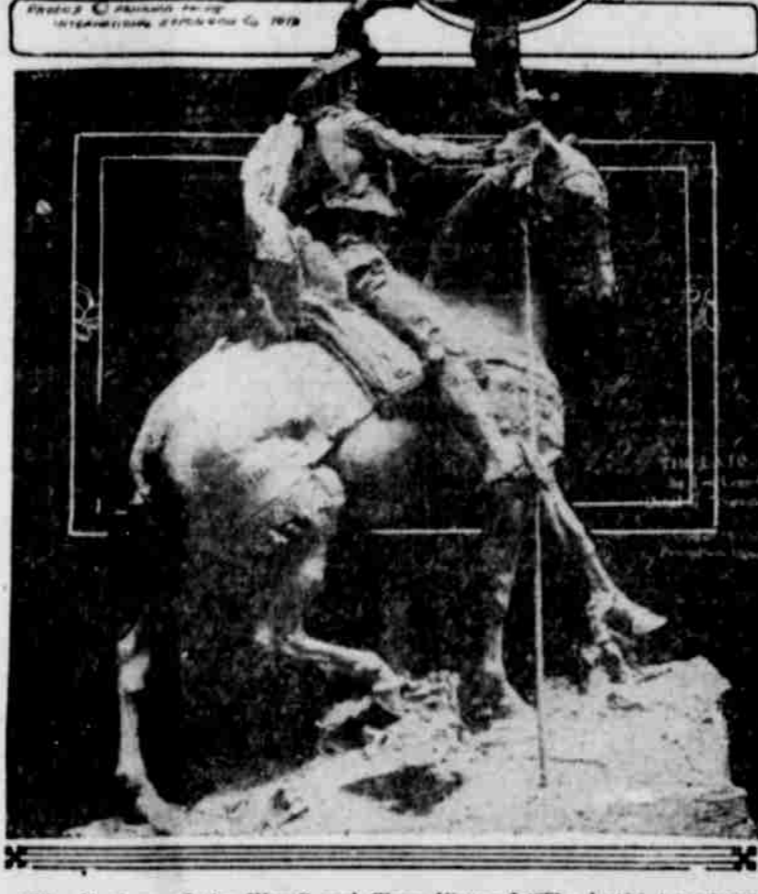
### "NATIONS OF THE WEST" WILL BE STRIKING EXPO FEATURE



Over the Arch of the Setting Sun, which is to surmount the western entrance to the great Court of the Sun and Stars at the Panama-Pacific international exposition, will be placed a magnificent sculptural group, representing the "Nations of the West," which will be a companion to the group representing the "Nations of the East," over the Arch of the Rising Sun, at the eastern entrance.

The "Nations of the West" is a composition by three noted sculptors, and depicts the great exploring, colonizing races of the Occident. The central feature of the composition is an old-fashioned wagon, drawn by oxen—a typical "prairie schooner," such as the westward-bound pioneers of the last century used for their immigration into the far west. In front of the wagon are "The Mother of Tomorrow," symbolizing the nation of the coming race, while two boys, "The Hopes of the Future," and a female allegoric figure, "Enterprise," surmount the wagon. All of these figures are by A. Stirling Calder, acting chief of sculpture for the exposition. They are masterpieces, especially "Enterprise," which is full of life and vigor, energetic daring and ambition.

The wagon and the oxen are by Frederick G. R. R. R., who also designed the pedestrians, representing a German, an Italian, an Alaskan and an Indian squaw, vivid types of North Americans.

### FEDERALS SEEK DON RADER FOR CHICAGO OUTLAWS

Don Rader, Medford's lone contribution to major league ball, received a letter Tuesday from the Chicago Federal league, asking if he would consider a contract in the outlaw organization and sounding him regarding his attitude toward organized baseball. Rader was touted last year as one of the most stable of the season's recruits, and played with the Chicago White Sox, being drafted in mid-season from the Pendleton team in the Western Tri-State league.

Rader received his 1914 contract from the White Sox last week, but it was so unsatisfactory that he told friends he would quit baseball forever before he would sign it, and threatens to send it back.

The Federal league announced last week that they intended to go out after the young blood as well as the stars of the old league, and the letter to Rader is in pursuance of this policy.

### SEEK TO ENJOIN ENFORCEMENT OF PEDDLER'S LAW

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 21.—Declaring that the so-called "peddlers' law" of the state of Oregon is discriminatory and that its enforcement means the violation of at least four points in the federal constitution, the executive officers of three counties, Multnomah, Clatsop and Hood River, were enjoined from its enforcement in a suit filed with the federal court today by attorneys for the Grand Union Tea company of New York.

The peddlers' law was passed by the legislature in 1909 and prohibits persons going through the country taking orders for the future delivery of goods to consumer without passing through wholesalers or retail stores. For this reason, the complaint states, the law's discriminatory. The complaint, among other things, declares the act violates the spirit of the declaration of independence. Going further back, it says the Magna Charta, the first declaration of rights of the people of England made in the twelfth century, and upon which the common law of this country is based, is violated by the act.

United States District Judge Wadsworth granted the temporary injunction and set the hearing for January 30.

### GOHAM GANGSTER FOUND GUILTY OF ATTACKING OFFICER

NEW YORK, Jan. 21.—"Dopey Benny" Fein, a notorious New York gangster, was convicted here early today of attacking Sergeant Patrick Sheridan. It required but forty-five minutes for the jury to bring in a verdict of guilty. The maximum sentence for the offense is five years in the penitentiary.

Terrorized by the threats of other gunmen, the jurors accepted the offer of Judge Malone for police escort to their homes. As Fein was being led from the courtroom he threatened to "get" Sergeant Sheridan.

"I will get you yet," he whispered to the officer.

Simultaneously with the conviction of "Dopey Benny," five gunmen entered a Bowery saloon, called the Tub of Blood and murdered its proprietor, Thomas Murphy. The police say that a man known as "Gyp the Blood," since the original of that name, was sent to prison shot Murphy.

"You squealed and sent the original 'Gyp' up the river," he told Murphy, "and now I'm going to get you."

Then he sent three bullets into Murphy's heart. The gunmen vanished, but five suspects were found in another saloon later.

### UNEMPLOYED AT SAN FRANCISCO RIOT FOR FREE SPEECH

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Jan. 21.—Five more prisoners were in jail here today on riot charges growing out of the local unemployed situation.

They were Mrs. Lucy Parsons, whose husband was hanged in Chicago years ago on a charge of participation in Chicago's famous Haymarket riot; John Sloan, Howard Sharp, William Delehanty and Chas. Monestiel. Mrs. Parsons and Sloan were charged with inciting riot, the others with disturbing the peace.

Property damage consisted of a number of store windows broken by stones or clubs thrown from the crowd.

The disturbance had its origin in a circular scattered freely about the city yesterday to the following effect: "All those who wish to protest against the high-handed and outrageous methods of the police force of San Francisco in raiding to prison William Thorp, Gus Meyers, Gus Bradigan, Pedro Cudero and H. Finley, thus attempting to overawe the unemployed, come to Jefferson square hall Tuesday evening, January 20."
