FILE SUIT FOR RESTITUTION OF FRISCO MILLIONS

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Jan. 22.—Suit was filed in the United States district court today against eleven present and former directors of the St. Louis & San Francisco railroad for the restitution to the treasury of that road of approximately \$11,500,000—the price which the "Frisco" paid in 1910 for the St. Louis & Brownsville and Mexico "feeder" line, plus losses which the Frisco is alleged to have suffered since from the operation of this line. The proceedings were filed at this time in order to obtain services upon Benjamin J. Younkum, chairman of the "Frisco" board of directors and one of the defendants, who came here to confer with officers of the St. Louis Union Trust company. The defendants named in the action follow: Chairman of the Board of Directors Younkum; James Campbell, St. Louis, vice-president; W. J. Bisby, St. Louis, former director; Thomas H. West, St. Louis, former director and receiver; A. S. Greig, St. Louis, former director; B. L. Winchell, Chicago, former president and receiver; C. W. Lillyard, New York, vice-president; R. A. Jackson, New York, former director; R. V. R. Thayer, Boston, director; Frank Trumbull, New York, former director; Hans Winterfeldt, New York, former director.
