CHARLES MURPHY DENIES EX-GOV. SULZER'S STORY

NEW YORK, Jan. 23.—The grand jury investigation was begun today into the story told yesterday by William Sulzer, that Charles F. Murphy of Tammany Hall sent a messenger to him during his impeachment trial offering to call off the impeachment if Sulzer would drop his graft investigation.

Sulzer repeated to the grand jury the story of his alleged dealings with the Tammany chief. District Attorney Whitman made it known today that this part of Sulzer's story and the alleged attempt of James Gaffney, Murphy's business and political associate, to exact \$100,000 political contribution from James E. Stewart, state highway contractor, would be subject to a test of inquiry.

Whitman said Murphy would be called as a witness in the John Doe inquiry. Murphy denounced Sulzer's story as false. He said he was willing to testify and waive immunity.
