

COLORADO TROOPS USE SABRES UPON CROWD OF WOMEN

TRINIDAD, Colo., Jan. 23.—Four women and one man were suffering from saber wounds today, eight women and ten men were under arrest, and the most intense bitterness prevailed in labor circles here as a result of the militia's action yesterday afternoon in charging with cavalry into a crowd believed by the soldiers to be on its way to San Rafael hospital to rescue "Mother" Jones.

At a women's organization, formed today, resolutions were adopted denouncing Governor Ammons for keeping soldiers in the coal strike zone, and a protest was telegraphed to President Wilson against "Mother" Jones' detention.

Adjutant General John Chase kept the saloons closed and the streets strongly patrolled by troops.

Under Chase in person, a cavalry detachment barred yesterday's women procession's progress near the near the post office and the general called on it to disperse. Men, mostly strikers, who were thick in the street, came to the women's aid at this. Stones began to fly.

When the confusion was at its height, Chase's horse reared and threw him. The crowd laughed derisively. At this, according to the strikers' account, the general evidently lost his temper and ordered his men to charge.

The troopers made three dashes with drawn sabres. Chase denied that the weapons were used, saying those who were hurt came in accidental contact with the weapons. Five suffered cuts, at any rate.

RIVERS ARRIVES TO FIGHT AD WOLGAST

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Jan. 23.—Joe Rivers of Los Angeles arrived here this morning for his ten round bout tonight with Ad Wolgast, the former lightweight champion. At noon he and Wolgast posed for the photographers and weighed in at 3 o'clock. Odds on the contest were at even money, but the betting was light. Rivers has been training for several days in Chicago.

SUPPOSED MADMAN TRIES TO SEE PRINCE

BERLIN, Jan. 23.—Reports that an attempt had been made to assassinate Crown Prince Frederick William resulted today from the efforts of a supposedly madman to see the prince. As the prince approached his town house and unidentified man came up to his automobile and demanded to see him. A sentry seized the stranger and held him until the police arrived.

RICH SICILIANS SHOT BY MAFIA CHICAGO STREET

CHICAGO, Jan. 23.—Two rich Sicilians were assassinated here early today, supposedly for "sneaking" on members of the Mafia.

Rosanna Despensia, one of the victims, was a private banker, well known in the local Italian quarter. The other, Antonio Puccio, owned several saloons and was formerly Despensia's partner in the banking business.

Puccio was standing on a street corner just before his death, chatting with a tall Italian, whose name the police did not learn. Three shots rang out suddenly and Puccio fell dead, while his companion was hit in the arm.

The latter fled as two policemen, attracted by the shots, rushed toward the scene of the murder. Before they reached the spot Despensia, who evidently had also heard the shooting, stepped from a neighboring doorway. There were two more shots and he, too, fell lifeless. The assassins escaped.

JAPS AT CHIHUAHUA GIVEN PROTECTION BY REBEL LEADER

CHIHUAHUA CITY, Mex., Jan. 23.—Japanese residents of Chihuahua state, having expressed anxiety concerning their safety at the rebels' hands because their government is regarded as friendly to President Huerta, General Manuel Chao, constitutional military governor of the state, published an order today guaranteeing protection for their persons and property.

General Ortega, the rebel commander, already just outside the town, has 12,500 men under him, with 9000 on their way to join them. General Valesco, the federal commander, has 6000, with 4000 reinforcements coming.
