

RECORD STORM OF FIFTY YEARS AT SAN DIEGO

SAN DIEGO, Cal., Jan. 27.—The record storm of fifty years continued until today. The expected renewal of the disturbance hit this city last night and high winds and a pelting rain prevailed throughout the night.

The rainfall to date since July 1 has been as much as the fall in the entire preceding twelve months. The city reservoirs are filling rapidly. Splendid crops are assured.

It was found today that small craft moored in Mission Bay, a shallow section of San Diego harbor, suffered in the gale. How many were sunk could not be learned early today. Streetcar traffic on many lines was tied up. No trains in or out on the Santa Fe since early yesterday have been run. Suburban service of the San Diego and South-Eastern is damaged.

As the day progressed, the clouds began to break and showed signs of the storm's abating.

to traffic yesterday was the Southern Pacific's Shasta route to Portland. The Shasta Limited rolled into Oakland last night about six hours late. It was the only train to arrive from outside the state during the day.

Reports from Fresno today stated that the lowlying section of that city was under several feet of water, but that the threatened break in the levees had been prevented. Hundreds of men worked all night. A cessation of the storm had relieved conditions and no further damage was expected unless a new storm arises.

The city of Sonora, in Tuolumne county, was still isolated today. Traffic by both railroad and team was tied up. The town was under two feet of water and the water in the nearby streams was higher than at any time in twenty years. All stores and buildings in the lower part of the town were flooded. The Sierra railroad, which operates between Oakdale and Sonora, made no attempt today to send trains through.

Flood Danger Poses.

San Jose reported that all danger from floods in the Santa Clara and Pajaro valleys had passed. The waters began to recede last night and today the lowlands which were submerged all of yesterday were free from flood waters. Ranchers along Coyote creek who fled from their homes early yesterday moved back today.

Father Jerome Ricard, Santa Clara university's "padre of the rains," scored another victory over the government weather bureau here. The official forecast was for continued rain today. Father Ricard predicted that the storm would break away last night and that today would be clear. His prediction was borne out. The day dawned cloudless and every indication here is for continued fair weather.

NEW HIGH LEVEL IN STOCK MARKET

NEW YORK, Jan. 27.—Five thousand shares of Steelware sold at the opening of the stock market today, the stock touching a new high level for the movement. In an active buying movement, Canadian Pacific jumped 1 1/4. Amalgamated rose 1. After the buying orders were filled there was a general reaction. Texas Pacific, Rock Island and Consolidated Gas dropped 1 each. The market was still under pressure at noon, but a better tone developed in the late trading, and the close was steady. Bonds were irregular.

Automobile rides alleged to have been taken by Mrs. Pace and Anderson in Los Angeles and Oregon City are also recounted in the complaint.

threatened the levees. The citrus crop there was reported safe. The body of Frank Rios, an aged Mexican drowned in Santiago creek, was recovered.

El Monte and San Gabriel river reached its highest mark in years. Search was being made for the body of Jose Rodriguez, who was drowned while catching driftwood.

One hundred thousand dollars was the damage estimated at Monrovia. One death occurred here as the result of the storm—Hugh S. Haven, a retired capitalist, being drowned in a flooded gutter.

Fullerton, Anaheim and other Orange county towns, reported the citrus and walnut crops safe. Two trans-continental trains were moved through Fullerton today, and the branch line between that town and Colton, the only line open, was crowded with trains of three roads.

UTAH MOUNTAIN AVALANCHE CAUSES DEATH OF THREE

STORES, Utah, Jan. 27.—With a roar heard for miles an avalanche, sweeping down the mountain side here Monday instantly killed three and seriously injured three others. Four houses were ground to splinters. Every tree in the avalanche's path was snapped off at the roots.

The bodies of Mrs. Anna Packovich and two Greek miners were recovered all trapped in their homes where they were crushed almost beyond recognition.

SECOND WETHERALL GIRL IN TROUBLE

Ida Witherell, age 14 years, daughter of Mrs. Arthur Walsh, was ordered committed to the state industrial school this morning by County Judge Tou Velle, at a hearing before Prosecutor Kelly. Ida alleged that she was assaulted by a blacksmith in an alfalfa field, a week ago, but owing to the lack of corroborative evidence arrests have not yet been made. The accused denied the allegations of the girl, but was unable to shake her story.

Ida is the second member of the Witherell family to be involved in statutory charges before the probation officers within a month. Febia a sister, made charges that caused the arrest of Tom Witt. They were married a couple of weeks ago, the groom escaping trial by jury, and the bride a term in the industrial school, thereby.

W. J. BRYAN OUTLINES PRESIDENT WILSON'S POLICY

NEW YORK, Jan. 27.—President Wilson's policy toward business and his proposed legislation affecting trusts promise to lower the cost of living at home and increase international trade, Secretary Bryan asserted before the American Asiatic society last night.

Bryan discussed the administration's attitude toward foreign commerce as reflected by the tariff and currency measures and the policies toward private monopoly and the Chinese loan question.

Of the trust regulation and prob-

able effect Bryan said: "The president has outlined the reform whose influence cannot be bounded by national lines. He had declared war on private monopoly. This means the investment of capital hitherto frightened away from our industrial fields."

Authorization of international banks under the currency law will stimulate the foreign trade in the Orient and South America, Bryan said, and the new tariff means a larger international trade.
