BURNED THEATRE PLACED BOMB FOR BLACK HAND LOVE

NEW YORK, Jan. 29.—How a motion picture theater was soaked with kerosene oil and fired and a bomb later placed in the hallway of a crowded Houston street tenement house was told to District Attorney Whitman today by Alfred Lohman, Antonio Sedatis and Rocco Puciarlo, members of an alleged Black Hand gang. These outrages were perpetrated, they said, that a gang leader might obtain vengeance for interference in a love affair. The three men are witnesses in the case of Angelo Sylvestro, charged with planting a bomb that wrecked the Houston street tenement.

Burned Picture Show "You never heard the inside story of the burning of the Hippodrome moving picture house, did you?" asked Lohman of Whitman. "Well, it was burned because its janitor, Joe, the Wop, butted in on Giuseppe Farrara's love affair. Farrara has skipped to Italy, so you can't get him.

"Farrara admired Nellie Pecarro, but her old man objected to him hanging around. Farrara proposed that we gangsters kidnap the girl and deliver her to him at a saloon. He promised to give us \$100 each. Sedatis, Puciarlo and myself undertook the job.

"We have to go through the Hippodrome theater to get behind the Houston street tenement where old Pecarro lived. Joe the Wop saw us hanging around and got his gang and chased us away.

Act of Revenge "When he told Farrara about it he was wild. He swore he would croak Joe. The next day he gave us kerosene and benzine and instructed us to 'fix' the theater so Joe the Wop would be out of a job. We spread the kerosene and benzine all over the seats. Farrara then threw a lighted paper on the floor and we beat it.

"People poured out of the place. A couple of children were burned a little. Someone turned in an alarm and the fire was put out before the theater was entirely burned.

"Farrara then said if he could not have the girl, no one else could. Then he gave us a bomb, and told us to put it in the hallway where old man Pecarro lived. He said it was strong enough to blow the place to hell. Sylvestro then planted the bomb while we watched.

Lohman told the district attorney that the bomb planted in the tenement house was found before it exploded.
