SHERMAN ACT TO STRIP SMELTER TRUST OF POWER

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30.—After months of quiet investigation the department of justice concluded it has sufficient grounds for suit to dissolve under the Sherman act the American Smelting and Refining company, the so-called smelter trust. It is improbable the suit will be filed immediately but it is understood preparations have gone so far that a bill in equity is being drawn. The American Smelting and Refining company and American Smelters Securities company which it controls, have a combined authorized capital of nearly \$150,000,000. Daniel Guggenheim is president of the refining company. The companies control many mines and smelters in the United States and Mexico.

MOYER'S ATTACK ROILS PRESIDENT GOMPERS

INDIANAPOLIS, Jan. 29.—Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, defended the organization and its executive council today before the United Mine Workers convention; said charges made by President Moyer, of the Western Federation of Miners, Duncan McDonald and others.

Moyer charged that if the Michigan copper strike lost the inactivity of the American Federation executive board would be responsible. Gompers asserted it would be impossible to levy an assessment for the copper strikers and denied that organization is "reactionary, fossilized, worm eaten and dead" and that the executive council is composed of "hoose fighters."

CALKINS UPHOLDS RIGHT OF STATE TO LICENSE MOTORS

Holding that the state has the right to regulate travel upon its highways, and collect fees from vehicles, the same as for registering deeds, Judge P. M. Calkins of the circuit court this morning handed down a decision declaring valid the state auto tax, contested by the Jackson County Automobile Protective association through the Henry E. Boyden case, released from jail on habeas corpus proceedings. A meeting will be held to decide upon making an appeal to the supreme court.

The court quotes numerous authorities for his decision, including findings in suits against the validity of the tax on bicycles that also were assessed as personal property, which was the chief contention of the anti-tax, holding that the license made "double taxation." This contention the court holds is counteracted by the necessity of maintenance of public necessities by taxation.

(Continued from page 1.) heeled over at once and began taking in water in cataracts.

All Aroused From Slumber

With hysterical screams, prayers, curses and cries for aid the night-clad passengers came rushing on deck. Many had been hurled from their berths and painfully hurt. Some were cut by splinters. All had been aroused from slumber, without a second's warning, to face death in the waves.

Of those who died the majority probably did not even have time to get out of their staterooms, so quickly did the ship go down.

With the collision the boat drill signal had sounded. The crew worked like madmen but they got only one boat overside before the ship's hull rolled over and down she went. As she disappeared beneath the surface there sounded first a fierce hissing and then her boilers blew up with a muffled roar.

Rescue Work Begun

In the vortex the surviving passengers and sailors were left struggling for their lives. Some had seized life-belts and these, in most instances, were the ones who were saved. More than half of them were unconscious when they were dragged into the Nantucket's boats.

Scarcely waiting to determine whether or not his own ship would go down under his feet, Captain Berry had launched every craft he had on board directly after his vessel had swung clear of the Monroe. For two hours the Nantucket cruised about the spot looking for survivors.

At first they were kept busy pulling the wretched men and women from the water. Then the rescues grew less frequent. Finally they became convinced that no more of the Monroe's company remained above water and the search was reluctantly abandoned.

Captain Johnson was one of those saved. The Nantucket reached here at 2:29 p. m.

Those on board the ship had fitted the survivors from the Monroe out with some odds and ends of clothes but it was still a nondescript company which finally staggered or were carried ashore. None but persons having business there were allowed on the dock.

The accident occurred in the Gulf Stream, where the water is warmer than elsewhere in the Atlantic in winter. Otherwise many more must have perished from the cold.

JACKSONVILLE SEEKS USE OF LOCAL ROCK

The city councils of Jacksonville and Medford are meeting this afternoon with Major flowly of the state highway commission, Sam Hill, the Good Roads enthusiast, and the county court headed by Judge Tom Velle and W. C. Leever in the city hall, to discuss the advisability of using stone quarried from the Jacksonville quarries upon the Pacific highway, and are expected to reach some agreement thereon. The supporters of the Jacksonville quarry maintain that its product is second to none, possesses admirable wearing qualities and texture, and would be the development of home industry. A number of Jacksonville citizens are in attendance.

WILSON'S MEXICAN POLICY ATTACKED; BRYAN FLAYED

PITTSBURG, Jan. 30.—Describing the Mexican policy of the Wilson administration as the work of "ambassadors, theorists, and dreamers, acting on impulse when not on prejudice," Representative Mondell of Wyoming arraigned Secretary Bryan in an address today before the Young Men's Republican club.

"The policy toward Huerta temporarily pursued by the Taft administration to emphasize our abhorrence and disapproval of the methods by which that government was established," said Mondell, "was allowed to drift into a state of aimless vacillation while the present secretary of state travels on lucrative lecture tours."

"The only feature of our present attitude toward Mexico that appears to have any element of fixity is in the fatuous and fantastic theory that we shall decline official relations with any government which the people on this hemisphere may establish unless composed of persons inaugurated under conditions compatible with our own ideas."
