HOUSE REFUSES DECLARATION UPON EXCLUSION POLICY

WASHINGTON, Feb. 3.—Placing patriots above partisanship, the house of representatives, by a vote of 263 to 54, refused this afternoon to make any declaration on an Asiatic exclusion policy aimed principally at Japan.
