VILLA GETS ARMS TO LEAD ATTACK ON MEXICO CITY

JUAREZ, Mexico, Feb. 4.—General Villa lost no time in taking advantage of the opportunity to properly arm his men. He arranged for the immediate delivery of 1,000,000 rounds of ammunition and ordered more in carload lots. At the same time he sent his legal adviser, Aguirre Benavides to El Paso to thank President Wilson, through General Hugh Scott, for what he had done and to ask the release of 1,500,000 rounds of ammunition, 5000 rifles and several rapid-fire guns recently seized by United States troops.

Scott, it was said, would comply and stop searching persons crossing the border as soon as formally notified that President Wilson has raised the embargo.

This business attended to, Villa left by train for Chihuahua City to hasten operations against Torreon. At Chihuahua City he will be joined by General Obregon, with a force of 5000 rebels from Sonora.

The impression here was that the United States troops would remain temporarily at the border but that in the near future they would be withdrawn, since with the arms embargo removed and the strongly pro-American rebel organization in control on the Mexican side, there will be no further use for them.
