MOMYER ON VISIT CRATER LAKE PARK

FORT KLAMATH, Ore., Feb. 6.—Park Ranger H. E. Momyer of Crater Lake National Park arrived here this evening en route to the government headquarters, five miles this side of Crater Lake.

Ranger Momyer says he has been ordered to visit the headquarters of the interior department to ascertain how things are. He will be accompanied from here by Joe Noriel, George Lisk, Charles Burns, Frank Burns, Harry Telford, and another who is with Telford in his work for the state fish and game commission and biological survey. The latter two men have been here several days gathering specimens of rare birds and animals to be found.

The trip to park headquarters and Crater Lake will be made on skis. The party will go to the Burns & Utter sawmill tomorrow morning by rig and from there will make the journey on skis. They expect to reach the government buildings by night and spend the night there. The following day they will go to the lake rim.

DEFENSE ON STAND IN FUEL TRUST TRIAL

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Feb. 6.—The Western Fuel trial was resumed in the United States court here today, with Professor A. M. Folsom of Stanford university on the witness stand. He testified concerning the effect of moisture upon the weight of coal. When Professor Folsom is excused the defense plans to put the four remaining defendants on the stand. James B. Smith, vice-president and general manager of the corporation, probably will be called first. It was thought the case would go to the jury tomorrow.

GOUGHAM POLICE KILLED IN BATTLE WITH GUN MAN

NEW YORK, Feb. 6.—Policeman Edward Murtha died early today in a Brooklyn hospital, and it was expected Fireman James O'Connor would succumb to wounds received in a fight with Giuseppe Arino, gangster and gunman, last evening.

Arino was looting on Murtha's beat and Murtha ordered him to "move on." Instead Arino pulled his pistol and shot the policeman in the chest, then started to run. Murtha blew his whistle as he fell, and O'Connor, Policemen Griffin and Struckle and a score of pedestrians attracted by the sound of the shot and Murtha's alarm, pursued the fugitive.

Seeing them gain on him, Arino turned and shot O'Connor, who was ahead. In turn he was wounded, though not fatally, by Policeman Struckle. Partly disabled by his injury, the gunman was taken a moment later. He put up a fierce fight even then, in which he was badly beaten.

Suddenly somebody in the crowd shouted "lynch him." At this so determined a rush was made to get at and hang the prisoner that the policemen had to use their night sticks freely to save him. He was finally safely locked up.

Police squads raided many gunmen's haunts throughout Greater New York last night and confiscated a quantity of weapons.

VILLA MANEUVERS FOR ATTACK UPON FEDERAL FORCES

CHIHUAHUA CITY, Mexico, Feb. 6.—The rebels were maneuvering for position around Torreon today. One force occupied Hermijillo, 40 miles north of the prospective point of attack. Thirteen hundred others, under General Oreste Pereyra, left by rail for Parral to Rosario, whence they planned to march overland to Pedra Blanca, striking at Torreon from the southward. There was constant skirmishing in the city's vicinity.

General Villa was here today, in personal charge of the situation. He ordered five thousand rounds of shrapnel from an ammunition dealer

in El Paso but it was not known certainly whether he would delay the Torreon attack until the shipment's arrival.

Hearing that handits under General Castillo had attacked the Mexican Northwestern railroad's Cumbre Tunnell, Villa ordered the rebel commanders at the towns of Pearson, Madera, Juarez and Casas Grandes to send forces to wipe out the outlaws.

The wires being down, it was impossible to get definite news of a passenger train which left Pearson yesterday morning for Madera, but the train had not reached its destination.

NO CONFIRMATION OF CAPTURE OF MAZATLAN

NOGALES, Ariz., Feb. 6.—Rumors that Mazatlan has been captured by the Mexican rebels were current here today, constitutional leaders, however, at Nogales, Sonora, had received no confirmation and were inclined to discredit the report.

WOLGAST SIGNS UP FOR FOUR CONTESTS

CHICAGO, Feb. 6.—Ad Wolgast, according to his manager, Tom Jones, is signed up today for four contests before March 1. Jones said the former lightweight champion is making as much money now as he ever did.

"February 16 Wolgast will meet Tommy Gary in Cincinnati for ten rounds," Jones said. "Then he will meet Patsy Drouillard in an eight-round bout at Windsor two days later. His next bout will be in New York, where he is to box Johnny Dundee ten rounds. Charley White will be his fourth opponent. They will mix at Milwaukee, February 27, ten rounds."

2 cups flour, 3 teaspoons baking powder, 1 teaspoon salt, 4 tablespoons Cottolene, 3/4 cup milk.
