The numbers were purely characteristic of Norway with its melancholy cords and its lullaby notes.

First on the program was a brief talk on Norway and Norwegian music by Prof. Tallandier, who is largely informed and who has made lecturing one of his specialties.

Mrs. Ed Andrews' three Grieg songs were greatly enjoyed and they were rendered with her usual technical skill and artistic finish.

Miss Venita Hamilton, a young and talented musician delighted her hearers with two beautiful Grieg numbers.

The Holberg suite is one of the most representative compositions of Grieg and Miss Hamilton rendered this with fine musical instinct and a brilliant display of technique.

Mr. W. Carleton James gave a violin number, a romance by Svendsen with the style and finish which the compositions of this conservative and classic writer of Norwegian music requires.

The last number on the program was the Grieg sonata. This sonata holds its position among the few great sonatas and Mr. and Mrs. James rendered this splendid composition with rare musical intelligence.

These musical matinees once a month given by the department of music of the Greater Medford club are surely and steadily growing in popularity as the increase in patronage shows.
