SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Feb. 7.—The Southern Pacific today asked the state railroad commission's permission to issue \$55,000,000 bonds at 5 per cent, maturing in twenty years. Of the money the railroad wants \$26,000,000 to pay 5 per cent notes due June 15, \$3,000,000 for new equipment, \$4,500,000 to pay loans due May 29, and the balance for additions and betterment.
