VANCOUVER EDITOR HORSEWHIPPED BY ENGLISH ACTRESS

VANCOUVER, B. C., Feb. 7.—Marie Lloyd, the English music hall comedienne, today expressed no regret for horsewhipping Louis D. Taylor, editor of the Vancouver World, and former mayor of this city, following a stinging criticism of her act and songs at the Orpheum theater, where she is the headline attraction this week.

Miss Lloyd and a companion found Taylor in his office about 3 o'clock Friday afternoon, and when he smilingly admitted that he was the editor, there were few words wasted before the actress drew from her large muff a thick leather strap and buckle, such as is used for steamer trunks, and struck him several times over the head. Then she quietly made her departure, while amazed clerks came rushing into the editor's office.

Miss Lloyd has been refused admission into the United States by the local immigration board on the ground that she is an "undesirable," the same charge that was preferred against her two months ago at Ellis Island, and she probably will have to remain all week in Vancouver pending her appeal to the commissioner of immigration at Washington, D. C.

The World attacked her act as vulgar and indecent, her songs were described as risque. Miss Lloyd was to head the bill at the Orpheum in Seattle tomorrow, but the engagement will probably have to be cancelled.

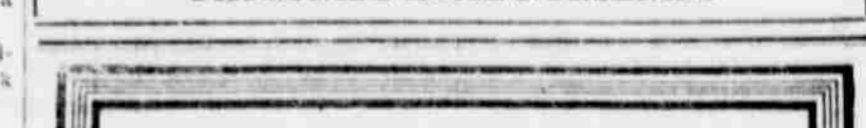
