

PAGE PURCHASES LINDLEY HOME ON SISKIYOU HEIGHTS

George R. Lindley, vice-president of the Jackson County bank, today sold his home on Siskiyou Heights to Dr. Frederick C. Page of this city. The place consists of a modern two-story dwelling and three acres of land, and is one of the most sightly locations in the valley, commanding a view of the entire Medford area. Dr. Page will move into the house June 1 and will extensively beautify the grounds. Mr. Lindley has two other east side properties which he will immediately improve. Neither party will state the purchase price, but it is known that Mr. Lindley recently refused \$10,000 for the property.

This is the second property purchased recently by Dr. Page, the first one being the Medford laundry property, having a frontage of 128 feet on East Main. Both transactions were made through the Page-Dressler company.

To the Editor:

I see so much talk about swatting the fly. This seems to me to be one of the greatest benefits the people of Medford can receive from the swatting committee. But I think it will be necessary for the city council to take a hand. The fly is very prolific as every one knows. Good breeding places is their delight. The manure piles give them the ideal place. You can't make very much headway against the fly unless you attack their stronghold, that is the breeding places.

If the city council will pass an ordinance compelling every person that keeps a horse or cow to prepare a fly tight receptacle to hold the manure until such time as they can haul it off, or use chemicals of some kind that will stop the flies from using it for a breeding place. This may work a hardship on some people to prepare for this kind of warfare but it will stop nine-tenths of the fly supply, the other one-tenth might be handled with the swatter and trap. It is worth trying.

DIGGS WEARY OF PRISON LIFE LOSES JAUNTINESS

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Feb. 7.—Maury L. Diggs did not try to hide the fact today that he was growing very weary of prison life. His inability to get bail plainly depressed him greatly. His face looked gloomy and the jauntiness had disappeared from his air.

In the courtroom he has maintained an excellent show of indifference, but his case did not come up before Judge Crist today, and there was nothing left for him but to spend the time as well as he could in the city jail. His friend, Walter Gilligan, was not allowed to associate

with him and in the society of the other prisoners it was clear that he was not at all interested.

Paul Spott, the third man arrested in connection with the case of Ida Peering, the girl the three were accused of attacking, succeeded yesterday in getting bail and was back at his home in Oakland.

Examination of the city and county records at San Jose, where the girl was born, failed to disclose a record of her birth March 9, 1896, the date given by Mrs. Peering, nor on any other date for some time both before and after the one mentioned. As doctors did not at the time make a regular practice of recording births the evidence was of not much value.

Spott's case, which is distinct from Diggs' and Gilligan's, was set by Judge Crist today for February 17.
