

# CRESCENT CITY HARBOR PROJECT GETS HATCHET

Army Engineers Reconsider Approval of \$1,600,000 Improvement and Kill Measure at Last Moment—Large Appropriations for Oregon.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12. It was expected the rivers and harbors bill would be reported to the house today. For the Pacific coast it includes the following appropriations, though, of course, the initial allowances will be but a part of the totals in each case: Sacramento and San Joaquin rivers, \$5,860,000. Richmond harbor, \$428,000. Humboldt bay, \$525,000. San Pablo bay, \$40,000. Petaluma creek, \$7500. Coos Bay, \$116,000. Willamette Falls, \$80,000. Coquille river, \$90,000. Coos river, \$3000. Siuslaw river, \$5000. Snake river, Oregon, Washington and Idaho, \$10,000. Columbia river, above Celilo Falls and Snake river, \$20,000. Columbia river, The Dalles to Celilo Falls, \$525,000. Columbia river canal at Cascades, \$10,000. Willamette river above Portland, \$50,000. Columbia and Lower Willamette river below Portland, \$300,000. Columbia river, mouth, \$1,000,000. Willapa harbor, \$100,000. Gray's harbor, \$30,000. Cowlitz and Lewis rivers, \$16,000. Puget sound and tributaries, \$25,000. Skagit river, \$10,000. Columbia river, between Bridgeport and Kettle Falls, \$25,000.

The army engineers reconsidered and temporarily disapproved the Crescent City harbor project, which had previously received a favorable report involving an expenditure of \$1,800,000. The San Rafael channel project, though approved, was not disposed of in time to get into the house bill. The Los Angeles harbor plans were awaiting more data from the district engineer. Big appropriations of national importance were as follows: Levee work on the Mississippi river from Rock Island to Cape Girardeau, \$7,000,000. New York harbor improvement, \$13,400,000. Purchase of the Chesapeake & Ohio canal, \$4,300,000. Improvement of Honolulu harbor, \$125,000. Improvement of Hilo harbor, \$100,000.

cow, unlike the beef animal, should take on little meat on the back and rump, leaving this part somewhat angular and bony. This is taken to show that the food goes to milk production. Stress was also laid in the consideration of the milk veins, as these are reliable points in determining the worth of an animal.

### Stick to one Breed

In connection with the dairy lectures emphasis was placed upon the value of picking a breed to develop, and sticking to that breed. The great fault at present, it was claimed, was that many farmers try to change breeds from time to time by merely crossing a bull of the breed desired with the herd kept, the result being that within a few years the entire herd is composed of "scrubs." E. Carey, in telling of the building up of his Jersey herd, laid great stress upon this point. Will Schulmerich, a dairy enthusiast, gave a short talk in which he showed the opportunities to be found in the dairy industry of this state.

Prof. W. A. Barr, coachman, lectured in one of the coaches on the silo, its uses and advantages; while G. R. Samsen, professor of animal husbandry spoke in another car, taking up more extensively the hog proposition.

## CRITICISM STIMULATES DANCING OF TANGO

Since the subject of the new dances has assumed such importance that the vatican at Rome has expressed a view on the matter, it seems that fresh impetus has been given to dancing, especially to the tango. A committee of dignitaries in London and another in Rome investigated the dance, and both concluded that the tango had been falsely charged. If anything, it was too sedate, too slow and too much like the old-fashioned minuet—all of which is very true, except that it takes grace and skill to do the intricate steps—which is what makes it so fascinating.

However, all this has but revived all manner of old dances, particularly those of sunny Spain and Italy, where the love of song and rhythm has always been a national entertainment. American dance experts, like Mr. and Mrs. Vernon Castle and the Maurices, declare that all the old dances of the Latin countries are coming to America, and that the tango is but the forerunner of many others.

## REMOVING NUISANCE FROM NEAR MARKET

After an uphill fight of more than two weeks, Councilman Medynski has succeeded in getting the nuisance removed from near the public market.

This nuisance consisted of fifty or more loads of street sweepings and barnyard manure, dumped within 100 feet of the public market, which 10,000 people patronize more or less for their food supply. This condition, which is a violation of the city ordinances, has been carried on continuously for the past two years, and it could not have been more systematically done had it been the intention to put the market out of business, for it was creating a breeding place for billions of flies within 100 feet of the greatest food supply station.
