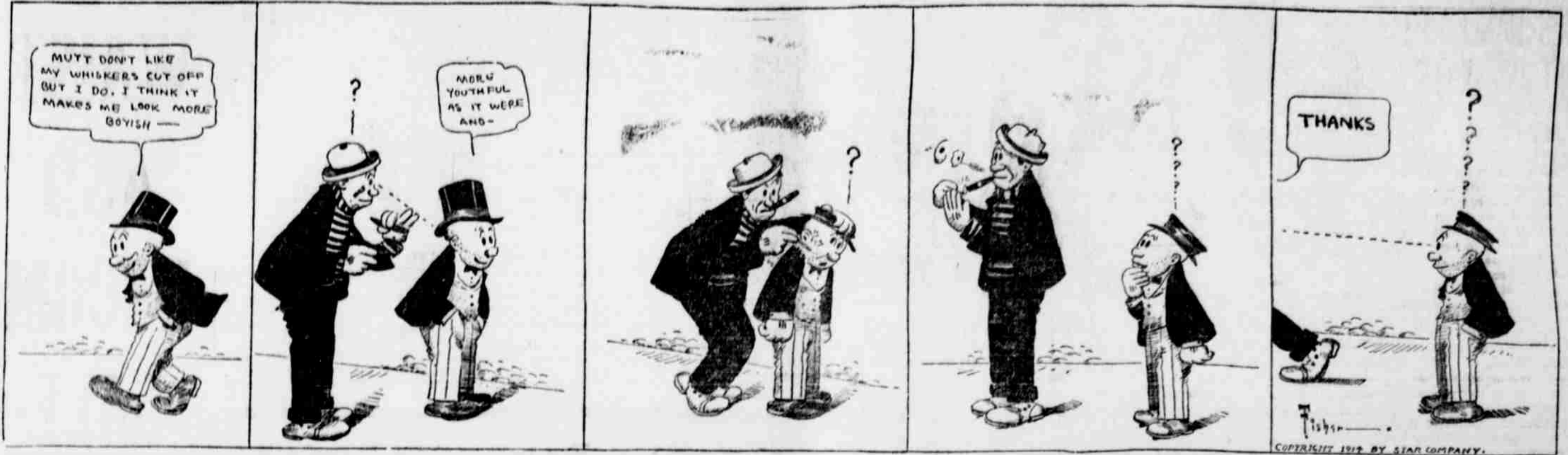


Jeff Is Almost as Good as a Cigar-Lighter

FISH AND GAME WORK OF STATE ON NEW BASIS

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 13.—The expected reorganization of the state fish and game departments has been accomplished. The work of the state game warden and of the master fish warden was split up and two new positions were created. State Game Warden W. L. Finley was given the title of superintendent of educational and biological department, and his salary was cut from \$3100 a year to \$2400. Master Fish Warden R. E. Clanton was given the title of superintendent of hatcheries, and his salary also cut from \$3100 a year to \$2400.

After the resolution introduced by Commissioner C. H. Evans of Lostine, to reorganize the departments along this line was put through over the objection of Commissioner George Kelly. Mr. Evans resigned from the commission, and was appointed state game warden at a salary of \$2100 a year. Theodore Opsund, chief clerk in the master fish warden's office, was appointed master fish warden, at a salary of \$2100 a year. He will also serve as secretary of the commission.

All of the members of the commission except George Kelly of Portland voted for the reorganization. Besides Kelly, the members are Floyd Bilyeu, H. H. Clifford, C. H. Evans and M. J. Kinney. Evans in Charge of Wardens. The reorganization is to become effective the first of March. Under the new arrangement Mr. Finley will oversee the propagation and introduction of game and game birds, and will look after the scientific end of the work, and Mr. Evans, the new state game warden, will look after the enforcement of all game laws, and will have supervision of the work of the game wardens.

Mr. Clanton will have charge of the fish hatcheries, and Mr. Opsund, the new master fish warden, will issue all commercial licenses and enforce all laws pertaining to the commercial fish industry, and also act as clerk of the commission.

Commissioner M. J. Kinney opposed the appointment of Opsund as master fish warden, and he also opposed the appointment of R. E. Clanton as superintendent of hatcheries. For this position he nominated H. L. Kelly Jr., of Oregon City, who received but the one vote. The appointments of Finley and Evans were unanimous.

Governor to Cut Expense. Governor West stated that he not only intended to see that the expenditures of the fish and game commission were cut down, but that he intended to show to the public each month just what the expenditures of the department are. He said he intended to have a monthly comparative report issued, beginning with the end of March, showing what the department spent for the current month a year ago.

The governor said State Game Warden Evans would get into the field, and by so doing would be able to dispense with the services of enough game wardens to more than make up his salary. He said the saving in the departments would be made by cutting down the list of employees and a general reduction in the service compatible with efficiency.

ROAD CONTRACTOR ORGANIZES FORCE FOR CONSTRUCTION

J. W. Sweeney, who has the contract for the Siskiyou end of Jackson county's great highway is at Ashland with his superintendent, Robert Elliott—also A. S. Riggs, who was superintendent for the Keasler & McDowell company, who recently started the work and then gave up their contract to Mr. Sweeney. A small crew of men under Chris Natwick are now at work on the preliminary clearing, etc.

Mr. Sweeney since his arrival has already hired a small crew of men and expects to employ all the local men he can get so far as the work will warrant—bringing men in only for those jobs that require expert knowledge. He stated that the crew will be comparatively small at first but will be gradually increased until he will have from three to four hundred men on the job at about the middle of the contract—after which the force will be gradually cut down as the work is finished.

Equipment was shipped in this week and is now being taken out to the scene of activities for the purpose of constructing camps and preparing quarters for the men and getting the necessary supplies on the ground.

AMERICAN NAVAL OFFICER TARGET MEXICAN BANDIT

VERA CRUZ, Feb. 13.—An attempt was made last night to assassinate Flag Lieutenant Arthur M. Cook of the battleship Connecticut in the street here. Though struck by a bullet in the hip he was only slightly hurt.

Lieut. Cook with his wife and woman friend, had dined as the guests of Admiral Mayo aboard the flagship, and were taking a carriage down the Avenida Independencia to the steamer Morro Castle, where his wife and friend were passengers, when Cook, in full dress white uniform was shot.

The assassin escaped leaving no trace. Cook reported the attack to Admiral Mayo this morning who communicated with John Lind and W. W. Canada, the American consul. They notified General Maas, the military commandant.

BRYAN AND CHINDA DISCUSS JAP ISSUE

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13.—Bryan and Viscount Chinda conferred on the California alien land legislation. It is believed it touch on the probable attitude of congress toward the Japanese desire for a new treaty affirming the right of the Japanese to hold lands here on even terms with other countries and citizens.
