### GRAND JURY PROBES ALLEGED VIOLATION BLUE SKY LAW

The spring term of the grand jury convened at Jacksonville this morning, and one of the most important matters to be investigated are the alleged violations of the Blue Sky law in this section as applied to the sale of stock in steel and rail ties, mining, oil, and hardwood timber projects located in other states. Corporation Commissioner Ralph Watson of Salem is in the city aiding in the investigation, and collecting evidence. Thousands of dollars annually are sent out of Jackson county in the promotion of the schemes under the probe.

Investigation of how two prisoners held in the county jail on charges of burglarizing a hardware store at Ashland secured files, in an interrupted attempt to break jail will also be made by the grand jury. Evidence against men held in the county jail on various charges will also be presented. The petit jury will begin its sessions a week from tomorrow. The grand jury is expected to complete its work this week.

The jury is composed as follows: Henry L. Gregory, foreman, Martin Perry, Ramsey Phillips, Fred Luy, Ross Kilne, Chris Keegan and R. B. Wilson.
