EXTENSION YANKEE TREATIES BEGINS

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20.—Extension of the General Arbitration treaties with foreign nations as the first move in the general policy to rehabilitate American foreign relations seemed assured today after the senate took up the consideration of the expired treaties and defined the issues involved.

Before the debate began on the treaties with Great Britain, Italy, Spain, Norway, Sweden, Portugal and Switzerland, President Wilson conferred with the senators and representatives about the treaties and the paramount issue of the Panama canal tolls.
