ENGLAND WANTS REAL PROTECTION FOR HER CITIZENS

LONDON, Feb. 21.-William H. Benton's death at Juarez, Mex., either at General Villa's hand or at his orders, was the topic of strong editorials and the subject of columns of correspondence in both the morning and afternoon papers here today

The news reached London so late yesterday that the government offices in Downing street were closed but the foreign office authorized a statement which the afternoon presinterpreted as meaning that England would insist that the Washington administration obtain satisfaction for Benton's killing and "really protect" Englishmen in Mexico in future.

The actual wording of the state-

"At the request of his majesty's ambassador in Washington, American government, which has promised protection to British subjeets in parts of Mexico where no British consulates exist, has instructed American consular representatives thoroughly to investigate eircumstances of Benton's
