

BRYAN INSISTS UPON FAIR TRIAL FOR GUSTAV BAUCH

CHIHUAHUA CITY, Mexico, Feb. 23.—Instructions to insist on a fair trial for Gustav Bauch, the German-American in a rebel prison here charged with being a federal spy, were received today by United States Consul Letcher from Secretary of State Bryan.

Bryan also called for the presence at the trial of others besides rebel officers. This was interpreted as supporting unofficial reports that William H. Benton, the Englishman shot at Jaurez, was tried by Drumhead court martial consisting only of rebel officers and that the prisoner was condemned on the unsupported testimony of two other rebels.

BRITAIN REFUSES TO FORCE ACTION AGAINST MEXICO

LONDON, Feb. 23.—"Though conditions in Mexico are causing the greatest injury to British interests, we do not propose to attempt intervention which would be futile and impolitic," under Foreign Secretary Aekland Hood told the house of commons this afternoon.

The under secretary spoke in the absence of Foreign Secretary Sir Edward Grey. Despite the government's attitude, many believed the pressure of public opinion would be so great as to compel it to insist on American action or acquiescence in interference from abroad.

Parker of New York City, Mrs. F. W. Clayton and Mrs. A. D. Stone of Mankato.

The meeting was unanimous for a state exhibit at the railroad depot in the Ashland yards, at which all sections of the state would maintain an exhibit.

The purpose is to ask the next legislature to make an appropriation of \$25,000 for the same, and it is Mr. Richardson's purpose to build up sentiment along this line before the new legislature is elected.

The various committees appointed to work up the normal school rally have their plans in operation and the armory will be filled on this occasion. The admission will be free and there will be no collection of soliciting for funds at the meeting. The expense of the meeting was met from a tag day on Saturday at the hands of the ladies, the price of being tagged being 10 cents. Dr. Geo. Hebe is expected to be the principal speaker from the outside. Committees will canvass the town after the meeting for membership in the Normal School association, the qualifications of which is a pledge to contribute \$10 or more to the club for the campaign. The Boys' Vocational club band will play and the Nishiyu quartet will sing.

The "go to church Sunday" campaign is permeating the city and everybody is boosting it. From the appearance of things, the churches will have to hold overflow meetings. 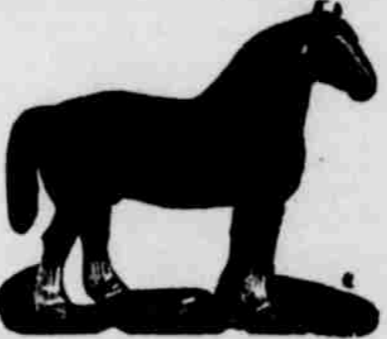
