

NEW FRUIT FIRM PLANNING TO ERECT PACKING HOUSE HERE

The recently organized fruit distributing firm of Dennis, Kimball & Pope are contemplating the building of a large packing house at Medford, and General Manager Pope is on his way here to make final decision concerning plans, according to local manager McKenny.

The following concerning the new firm is reprinted from "the Fruitman's Guide," New York City:

"The new incorporation of Dennis, Kimball & Pope, briefly alluded to in the last week's Guide, stands for one of the most important and widespread systems of distribution that has ever been brought before the attention of the American shipper. UPWARD TENDENCY LIVESTOCK MARKET

PORTLAND, Feb. 23.—Receipts for the week have been: Cattle, 1634; calves, 4; hogs, 5702; sheep, 5269.

A big week on the cattle market, particularly the first half. Offerings of butcher cattle, cows, heifers, etc., were extremely short of trade needs compared with steel consignments. The best quality grain-fed bullocks sold at \$7.80 to \$8, and cows, \$6.75 to \$7. Bull trade was slow, but calves ruled firm. After Monday receipts were not as heavy as expected.

Hogs were the real sensation of the period, as they opened, up on Monday at \$8.65 and got to \$8.75 by Wednesday, in the face of a deluge. The bulge was not a spasm, either, as it maintained a firm front right up to the close of the week. Buying of swine was spirited and competition among the killers to get stock of any weight so long as it had a smooth finish produced a real live market.

Lamb transactions carried off the honors in the sheep house. Several lots of medium grade ewes went over the scales, and a bunch of yearlings at \$6 comprised the bulk of mutton sale. The best grain lambs sold at \$6.75, the first shorn stock of the season arriving this week.

Summary: Cattle market, steady to firm; hogs, strong; sheep and lambs, steady to firm, with an upward tendency.

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BOURNE'S DUTIES MAY PREVENT HIS BEING CANDIDATE

The following letter received from Ex-Senator Jonathan Bourne, Jr., indicates that his candidacy for the senate depends largely upon whether congress extends the time of the joint committee on highways of which he is chairman for another year. If the time is extended he will not be a candidate. He writes the following under date of Washington February 16:

"But for my work on the two joint congressional committees here during the past year I should cer-

tainly have remained in Oregon while I was out there last fall putting in my time trying to cover the state, getting in close contact with the people, submitting to them some ideas I have, in the adoption of which I believe our government would be improved, getting the benefit of their ideas and wishes, and on the whole making an aggressive campaign for re-election to the senate, but conditions absolutely prevented that. Having voluntarily assumed duties here, I felt it my duty to the best of my ability to perform the trust. This is not hot air or hyperbole, but a plain statement of how I view the situation.

"I realize every day's delay in returning to Oregon will jeopardize my chances of election, yet I am obliged to stay here and do what I can toward completing this work before the 3d of March, and if before that time congress should conclude to extend the time of the two commissions, of which I am chairman,

for another year and the members of the commissions should be able to go on with the work from week to week during March, April and May, I should be obliged to give up any thought of being a candidate before the primaries the 15th of next May.

In any event I desire to express my sincere appreciation and gratitude to the people of Jackson county for the confidence they have shown in me and to state that I shall always take great pleasure and consider it a personal favor if at any time a situation develops wherein you think I can be of help in bringing about results beneficial to Jackson county."
