

800 CARLOADS OF WENATCHEE APPLES NET GROWERS \$1.25

WENATCHEE, Wash., Feb. 26.—The Wenatchee Produce company yesterday sent checks to growers in final settlement of its apple pool of 800 carloads. On the last 410,000 boxes the average returns on orchard run are \$1.25 per box. From this is to be taken 8 cents commission and handling charge, leaving a net to the grower of \$1.17 per box. Growers are highly gratified, for the produce company handled a large proportion of low grade fruit, more so than any other agency. Nearly 4000 boxes consisted of unpacked jumble stuff which brought 55 cents per box. This brings down the average considerably. Five-tier C grades brought 75 cents, larger sizes 85 cents. Delicions and Winter Banana C grade returns are \$1.25. Following are the returns on extra fancy sizes, 125 and larger: Winesap, \$1.55; Jonathan, \$1.35; Rome Beauty, \$1.40; Spitzenberg, \$1.60; Gano, \$1.35; Delicious, \$1.30; Grimes Golden, \$1.35; Arkansas Black, \$1.75; Staymen, \$1.35; White Winter Pearmain, \$1.50; Black Twig, \$1.25; Yellow Newtown, \$1.50; Winter Banana, \$2.00; King David, \$1.35; Missouri Pippin, \$1.30; all others, \$1.10 to \$1.25. Fancy grades sold at 10 to 15 cents per box less.

There was a dramatic sequel in the High Court in London recently in the pending action in which Mr. Alexander Brodrick Leslie-Melville, banker, is suing for divorce on the ground of his wife's misconduct, and names Earl Fitzwilliam as correspondent. The latter's counsel asked that Mr. Frank Harris, who is stated to be the managing director of a newspaper called Modern Society, be committed for contempt of court because the newspaper has published a most scandalous article about the pending divorce action. The result was that Mr. Harris was arrested in court and committed as a prisoner.

FEDERALS ABANDON HOPE OF MATHEWSON

NEW YORK, Feb. 26.—James A. Gilmore, president of the Federal League, admitted here today that he had abandoned hope of signing Christy Mathewson, star twirler for the New York Giants. Then Gilmore told why he made Matty an offer. A New York reporter said I had offered all the stars in baseball contracts except Mathewson," said Gilmore. "I investigated and found that Matty was not under contract but that President Hempstead had mailed a blank contract, telling him to fill in his own figures. This contract has not been returned. "I wired Matty at Los Angeles offering him twice as much as he received from the Giants last year, to manage the Brooklyn Federals. I have received no answer and do not think there is the slightest chance of landing him."

COUNCILMEN FAVOR THE REMOVAL OF CHIEF AMANN

Colonel H. H. Sargent gave out the following authorized interview last night regarding his position on the removal of Fire Chief Amann: "In an article in the Mail Tribune of February 25, with reference to Fire Chief Amann, it is stated that Councilman Sargent of the second ward is leading the action against Amann. I wish to say that is not correct. The facts are these: "At a meeting of the six councilmen two weeks ago it was unanimously agreed that the city could well dispense with the services of the fire chief. "One councilman, Mr. Porter, stated that the fire chief had told him he was going to resign. Whereupon it was agreed that if he did so that would solve the problem satisfactorily. "One of the councilmen was asked to see the chief and inform him of the action of the council. As Chief Amann had already told Councilman Porter he would resign it was felt he certainly would hasten to do so as soon as he learned of the action of the council. "As a matter of economy we were in favor of dispensing with the services of the fire chief for the present, the assistant chief to perform the duties. It will thus be seen that I have not been leading the fight against Chief Amann any more than the other councilmen. "I still think that no chief other than the assistant chief is needed for a while, anyhow, and unless some councilmen have changed their minds in the matter this is the unanimous opinion."

IGNORE G. O. P. PLEA BULL MOOSE PLAN

CHARLESTON, W. Va., Feb. 26.—Seeking amalgamation with the progressive party the republican state committee at an executive session tonight decided to ask the progressive leaders to meet them at a "get together" conference March 18. Governor Hatfield urged that the republican party and its principles be preserved. Progressive State Chairman Handlan issued a statement that his party did not seek amalgamation and would stand by its resolve not to treat with the republicans.

ANOTHER PIONEER OF 50'S PASSES AWAY

Mrs. C. A. Schmidt, of 540 South Fir street, returned Sunday from Red Bluff, Cal., where she was called to attend the funeral of her uncle, William Hubbard, who died near that place recently, aged 77. Mr. Hubbard came across the plains in 1857 and settled at Red Bluff. In the early days he freighted all over Northern California and Southern Oregon, bringing in the first saw mill ever in Jacksonville. He made many trips to the Rogue river valley in the early '60s. Four years ago he visited his niece here and was amazed at the changes that had taken place since he had first seen this place. Mr. Hubbard came to his death through a fall from his horse while riding from his home on Jaynes creek after the mail. The lifeless body was found on a hillside the next day. He was the last of 40 men who crossed the plains together. He leaves a sister at Paoli, Okla., a brother at Coyle, Okla., another brother in Kansas, besides his niece in Medford.

UNKNOWN COUPLE DROWNED BY FLOOD

NORTH YAKIMA, Wash., Feb. 26.—Authorities here today are trying to learn the identity of a man and a six-year-old girl whose bodies were found in Selah creek, twelve miles north of here. The man was lodged against a bridge with the child some distance up stream. The bodies of two horses were several hundred yards up stream where a two-seated buggy was found upset. A woman's skirt and handbag found near indicated that there might be other victims. The creek was recently swollen by flood waters, but now is dry. A bible in the man's pocket bore the name "J. H. Shaw" on the fly leaf.

BANDIT LOPEZ SEEN AT MINNEAPOLIS

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., Feb. 26.—That Rafael Lopez, the Mexican wanted at Bingham, Utah, for a series of six murders, had applied to him for work, was asserted here today by Moses Zimmerman, a local horse dealer. He knew the man, he said, through having met him in Denver a year ago. Lopez fled into the hills after his first murder, several weeks ago, killed three officers who were pursuing him and then took refuge in the Utah-Apex mine, where he killed two more men who ventured inside to arrest him. His besiegers thereupon sealed up all but one entrance to the mine and tried, first to smoke the fugitive out and later to kill him by forcing poisonous gases into the workings. In some way, Lopez escaped, however.

JUSTICE WRIGHT CALLED DISGRACE TO THE JUDICIARY

WASHINGTON, Feb. 26.—Sensational charges of professional and private misconduct were filed here today against Justice Daniel Thew Wright of the District of Columbia supreme court by Wade Cooper, a Washington financier. Justice Wright is the man who sentenced Samuel Gompers, John Mitchell and Frank Morrison, labor leaders, to prison terms for alleged contempt of court. The case is still pending in the courts. In his complaint filed at the executive offices here, Cooper alleges that Wright is a "disgrace to the judiciary of the nation." The charges include allegations of financial and moral wrongdoing; that certain corporations have been favored by Wright, and that his general conduct, on and off the bench, has been improper for a judicial official.

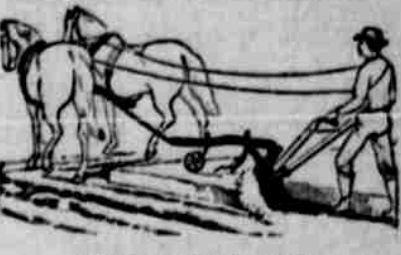
