

ASK MORE MONEY FOR ALASKA EXHIBIT AT WORLD'S FAIR

JUNEAU, Alaska, Feb. 27.—Unless congress can be induced to increase the appropriation, or help comes from some outside source, Alaska's exhibit at the Panama Pacific exposition in San Francisco will be far from adequate, according to a letter dated Washington, D. C., to Governor Strong, from Adolph C. Miller, chairman of the government exhibit board. Chairman Miller writes:

"It seems to be wholly impossible to represent Alaska upon a scale commensurate with the Seattle exhibit of 1909, for which \$100,000 was appropriated. As you know the funds at our disposal amount to only \$500,000. With that we must prepare, maintain and return exhibits of the entire United States government and in addition, of Alaska, Hawaii, Porto Rico, the District of Columbia and several semi-official commissions. We must provide for a total of forty-nine different bureaus and governmental agencies. You can well understand that only a few thousand dollars can be allowed to any one bureau or agency."

may be surgeons if deemed desirable, to the spot.

Offer is Accepted

"The party will be taken directly to the cemetery, where the body will be disinterred and every opportunity furnished to examine and identify it."

"I directed Letcher to notify Villa that we accept. I have also notified the British ambassador here of what we have done and are doing. The details of the prospective visit to the cemetery are being worked out."

United States Consul Edwards, at Juarez, notified the secretary of state that Gustav Baugh, the missing German-American, positively is not there. The consul said he had incontrovertible proof that Baugh had not been in Juarez since February 18, when a court martial was convened to try him on the charge that he was a federal spy.

State department officials did not try to conceal their belief that the missing man was taken to Chihuahua City and executed.

It was stated that the only foreigners in jail at Juarez at present are accused of nothing worse than such minor offenses as drunkenness and brawling, and are in no danger.

Probably Executed

Bryan was keeping a sharp watch on the doings of Governor Colquitt of Texas, whom he warned against sending Texas state troops across the border, which he has been quoted as threatening, an invasion of a foreign country being a matter entirely outside the authority of any but the federal government.

The secretary of state denied the administration had communicated with President Huerta relative to any plan for ending the Mexican rebellion. He was specific in his denial of a report that Huerta had told Charge d'Affaires O'Shaughnessy he would like to co-operate with the United States in re-establishing peace, if President Wilson would withdraw his order raising the embargo on the transfer of arms across the border from American to Mexican soil.

In fact, Bryan said, there had been no communication between the administration and Huerta's government since John Lind left Mexico City, beyond the most ordinary routine messages.

Asked if he would entertain any sort of proposal from the Mexican dictator, the secretary replied that the Washington government adhered to its original view—that Huerta's elimination was necessary.

Before the house foreign affairs committee Congressman Alney of Pennsylvania made a strong plea for a favorable report on his resolution calling on the president for details of the Mexican situation and an account of all outrages committed on foreigners in Mexico.

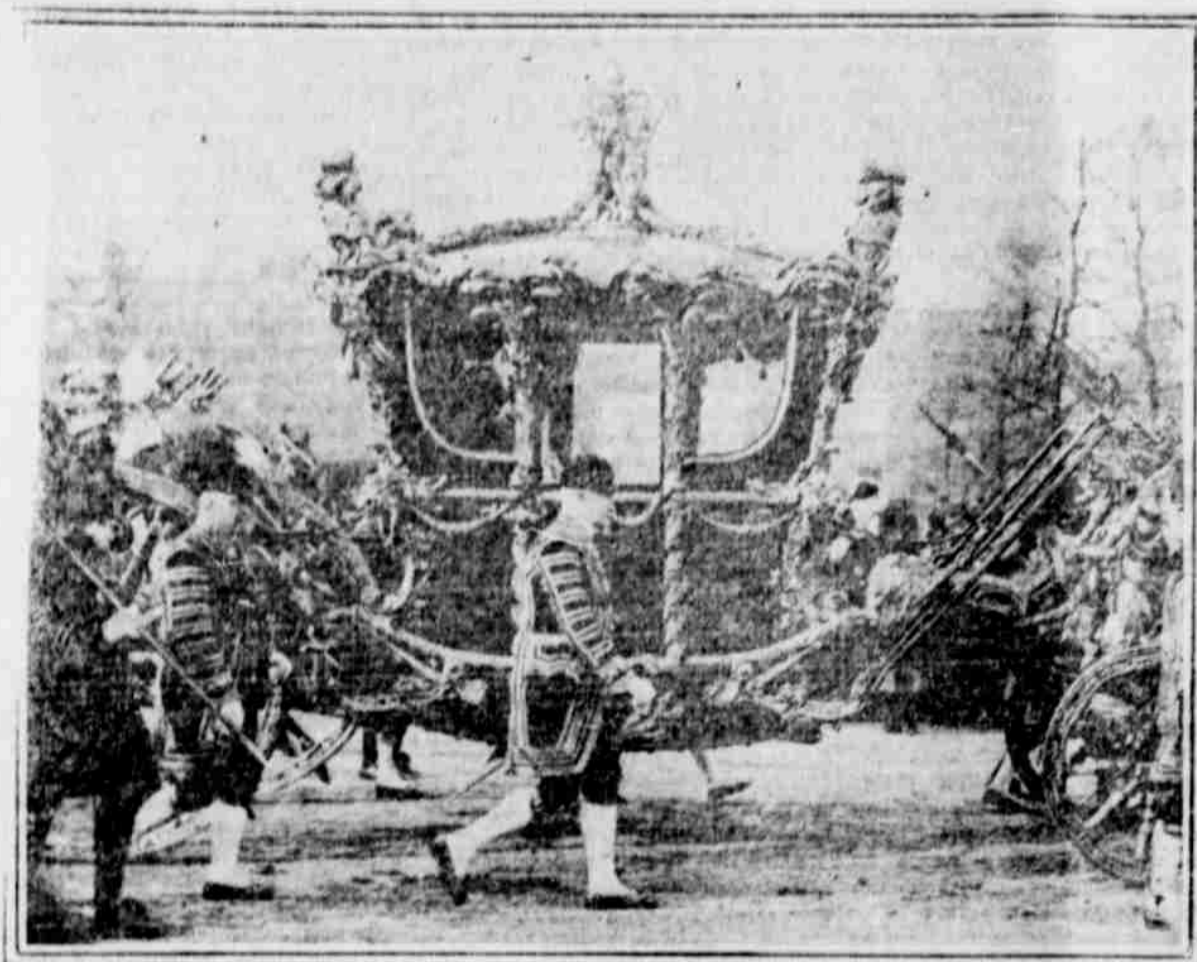

COMPTON EITHER DEAD OR IN PRISON CHIHUAHUA STATE

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Feb. 27.—Harry Compton of Oakland, for whom the state department is searching in Northern Mexico, either is confined in the quartel at Ojinaga, Chihuahua state, or has been executed. He has never been in jail at Chihuahua City, as the state department had been informed.

This declaration was made today at Garden Grove, near here, by Mrs. George Rolfe, Compton's mother, who said that her son's letter telling of his predicament had been transcribed incorrectly. The letter further stated, Mrs. Rolfe said, that Compton was under arrest as a citizen of Mexico and expected to be executed.

Mrs. Rolfe learned only yesterday of the general supposition that her son is at Chihuahua City. She turned a letter over to Editor Perry of Garden Grove News, who telegraphed the information it contained to Secretary Bryan. Bryan replied by wire that the news had been wired to Consul Edwards at Juarez, with instructions to investigate.
