

### GAME EXPENSES CUT \$78,000 FOR BALANCE OF YEAR

SALEM, Or., March 2.—About \$78,000 was lopped off of running the state fish and game department in the budget submitted to the fish and game commission by the department heads at a meeting Saturday. The cost of running the department last year was approximately \$294,000, while the total of the budgets submitted for the rest of this year was \$126,000. Definite action was taken on the budgets as the commission ordered copies made and submitted to the members for study, so action can be taken at the regular meeting to be held soon.

State Game Warden Evans was authorized to reimburse as many of the thirty-odd deputies that have been dismissed as he deemed necessary for the good of the service.

Acting on the request of W. L. Finley, now in charge of the educational and biological division of the work, the commission dismissed L. Alva Lewis, employed on biological work being done by the state and government co-operation. The cause given was "disloyalty to the commission and the making of false entries and malicious statements." Finley said Lewis had written false statements to the governor about the work of Finley and R. E. Clanton.

The budget submitted by Mr. Finley for educational and biological work amounted to \$27,820. Mr. Clanton's budget, as superintendent of hatcheries, was \$18,125 for the Salem hatchery work, and he estimated that the trout hatchery work, which had been done under the supervision of Mr. Finley heretofore, would amount to about the same. Theodore O'pand, master fish warden, estimated the expenses of his department for the remainder of the year at \$11,700, while C. H. Evans, state game warden, placed the expenses of his department at \$49,950.

Christian said that his brother had killed himself early last night, but he failed to report the matter until today.

A note signed, "Charles," was found in the brother's room. It read: "We have been using only our own money and the banks there will tell you so. I don't know what I am suspected for, as I have done nothing to be suspected."

There was another note, which Christian Stuberud admitted he had written to a clairvoyant, which contained these questions: "Will he die of kidney disease?" "When will he die and in what year?"

The Stuberuds, who were in middle age, came here recently from Canton, S. D., where they conducted a shoe store. They were "tourists." Charles, it was shown by his effects, had a bank account at Canton. His brother was his only relative.

### \$40,000 FARM TRADED FOR MEDFORD ORCHARD

CENTRALIA, Wash., March 2.—W. C. Armantrout has sold his 230-acre ranch in Hannaford valley to J. M. Schmidt of Medford, Oregon.

The sale price was \$40,000, being one of the largest ready transfers made here during the past year.

Armantrout took as part payment for his property, which is one of the finest farms in southwest Washington, Schmidt's 18-acre orchard near Medford.

Included in the sale of the ranch were 54 head of cattle, 13 head of horses and other stock, 150 tons of hay, several hundred bushels of grain and farming implements to the amount of several thousands of dollars.

The horses, according to the judge, ran for a long distance and he was blinded early in the excitement by the shower of mud precipitated upon him from the flying wheels of the animal. No longer able to see, he hung on to the lines and trusted to his good luck, which vindicated itself by switching the team into a bog. They came to a sudden stop and Mr. Colvig was thrown over the dashboard, painfully bruising his arms.

Finally extricating himself from the bog and wiping enough of the mud out of his eyes to allow him to see, he made his way back to Eugene and let an oculist finish the job of removing from his vision the keepsakes of Lane county good roads which he had collected.

### CATTLE BARON GETS PROPERTY FOR ANNUITY

NOGALES, Sonora Mex., March 2.—In exile for more than a year, Manuel Mascarenes multi-millionaire cattle baron, was restored to his Mexican rights today by General Carranza upon his agreement to pay \$1000 monthly into the constitutionalist treasury.

Mascarenes owns thousands of acres in Northern Sonora, and was considered to be the wealthiest man in northern Mexico with the exception of Luis Terrazano. He is with his family in San Francisco.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., March 2.—Suit for absolute divorce against Mrs. Marion J. Smith was filed here today in the superior court by Frank H. Smith, a wealthy insurance man. Among other things, Smith charged: That Mrs. Smith smoked cigars and cigarettes in street cars.
