NOGALES, Sonora, Mexico, Mar 3 .- Members of General Carranza' cabinet refused today to predict the result of the expected meeting between the rebel chief and Special Agent George Carothers of the state department, who is on his way to Nogales from El Paso. He is expected to urge Carranza to go Juarez and personally direct an invest!gation of the death of William Ben-

Carothers had not appeared here before noon, but members of the Carranza party admitted that they were expecting him. The customs house on the border was the like liest place for the meeting.

An evident air of satisfaction prevailed on the Mexican side of the international border after the coming of Carothers was announced. Constitutionalists were elated over the American recognition of Carranza as the head of the rebel movement.

Carranga kept to his quarters during the morning. He was visited occasionally by members of his staff but received no other visitors.

WASHINGTON, Mar. 3 .- Suit to test the free sugar section of the Underwood tariff law was started before the supreme court here today by augar cane growers. The case is known as the Louisiana "original" suit and was instituted in an effort to have that section of the tariff removing the 20 per cent duty on Cuban sugar declared void.

The sugar cane growers were represented by Attorney General Pleasint of Louisiana, former Senator Joseph Batley of Texas and Paul Christian, legal representative of the American Sugar Growers association.
