

URGE GARRANZA TO VISIT JUAREZ IN BENTON CASE

NOGALES, Sonora, Mexico, Mar. 3.—Members of General Carranza's cabinet refused today to predict the result of the expected meeting between the rebel chief and Special Agent George Carothers of the state department, who is on his way to Nogales from El Paso. He is expected to urge Carranza to go Juarez and personally direct an investigation of the death of William Benton.

MRS. OLWELL LOSES DIAMONDS

FRESNO, Cal., March 2.—Diamonds valued at more than \$1000 by the owner, Mrs. J. D. Olwell, of Medford, Or., lost Tuesday night between the Hughes and Fresno hotels, are being kicked around the streets of Fresno, notwithstanding the fact that a most liberal reward has been offered for their recovery and return.

The jewelry was not missed until 10 o'clock the same evening, when Mr. and Mrs. Olwell returned to their apartment. Yesterday morning Mrs. Olwell reported the loss to the police, describing the lost jewels as a diamond pendant set in platinum, valued at \$700; a pair of earrings each containing three diamonds, valued at \$400, and a lady's open face watch with the monogram "I. E. C." on the back.

GUNMAN GLAD TO FIND SAFETY IN JAIL

ST LOUIS, Mo., Mar. 3.—Instead of finding fault with jail life, Henry Zang, who shot and killed "Red" Simon at noon yesterday, declared today that he found it a blessed relief.

"Last night," he said, "I had my first sound sleep since I testified before the grand jury in connection with the charge that Simon murdered Emmett Carroll. And the reason I slept well was that I knew Simon's gang couldn't get me here in jail."

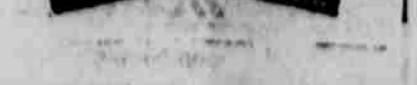
