DYNAMITE EXPLODES IN FARMER'S ARMS

TILLAMOOK, Or., March 5.—I. B. Kay, a farmhand employed on the ranch of T. J. Harris, south of here, is probably dying today as a result of an explosion of dynamite which he was carrying out to a field to blow up stumps with. Kay held the caps under his left arm, carrying a battery in his right hand. In some way the wires attached to the battery became connected and the caps exploded. More than 100 wounds were inflicted upon Kay, one through his left lung being close to the heart.

ELLIS GUILTY OF MURDERING WIFE GIVEN 15 YEARS

CHICAGO, Mar. 5.—William Cheney Ellis, formerly a wealthy harness manufacturer of Cincinnati, found guilty of wife murder here this afternoon and sentenced to serve fifteen years in the state penitentiary. Ellis killed his wife in a Chicago hotel after they had witnessed a performance of the play "Damaged Goods" at a local theater.

Ellis's defense was based on insanity. He attempted to prove that a strain of insanity ran through his family and told the jury that he was subject to epileptic fits. Testifying in his own behalf last Saturday, Ellis admitted that he was suffering from an incurable disease when he led his wife to the altar.

AMERICAN LEAGUE TO FIGHT FEDS TO FINISH

NEW YORK, March 5.—Ban Johnson, president of the American league, arrived in New York late this afternoon. He declared his organization intended to fight the Federal league to a finish.

"I am not in favor of so many confabs," said Johnson. "If the idea is to bring about a peaceful settlement with the Federal league, the American league will stop such negotiations. We are not going to enter into any peace pact, but intend to cut and clash."
