

SUES TO ENJOIN PENALTY PAYMENT DELINQUENT TAXES

PORTLAND, Ore., March 6.—Roger B. Simont today is preparing to file in the Multnomah circuit court a friendly suit to enjoin the county officials from imposing penalty for non-payment of taxes delinquent after April 1. This step is being taken in Mr. Simont's campaign to secure a "deferred payment" plan of collecting all taxes, city, county and state. The suit had not been filed late today.

Simont recently called upon city, county, school district, port and dock authorities for information whether or not the entire amount of money expected from taxation is actually needed at once or as soon as the law provides for payment. All these officials stated that all this money is not needed for immediate use and that it would make no difference to them if the funds were collected at stated intervals during the year.

Simont expects his suit to have a far-reaching effect, as counties throughout the state, he says, are interested in relieving the tax burden.

In the event of intervention by the United States in Mexico more than 15,000 men in the State of New York will be under arms within twenty-four hours after the receipt of an order from the War Department to mobilize. Regimental depots will be established at all the armories, and with every citizen soldier on duty in response to the call New York will assume the aspect of a great garrison of 10,000 men.

Some of the confusion which characterized the assembly of the citizen troops in 1898 will be apparent. Each and every item has been arranged for by the recently organized and highly complete machine of the Divisional Headquarters staff. When the call comes there will be no official misunderstanding or embarrassment. The machine will be set in motion, and troops, companies and batteries will find themselves being equipped and made ready for immediate service before the outside world is aware of the fact.

LIKE BEATINGS, BUT DREW LINE ON BEING BURNED

PORTLAND, Ore., March 6.—"The more I beat her, the better she likes me," explained Robert Leroy to Municipal Judge Stevenson today. His wife, Minnie, however, had appealed to the police, saying that when his beatings exceeded her idea of love taps and she protested, he had threatened to tie her to a stake and burn her alive. The judge put Leroy under \$500 peace bonds and he was sent to jail in default.

VILLA TO SEND TERRAZAS TO FRONT AS A TARGET

CHIHUAHUA CITY, Mex., March 6.—General Villa was expected to send Luis Terrazas, Jr., forward to word Torreon on a troop train tonight. The time limit for the \$500,000 ransom demanded of Terrazas' father expired this morning, no ransom having come, and it was said Villa was determined to fulfill his threat to keep the prisoner at the front in the Torreon attack.

PLAN TO REORGANIZE SANTA ROSA RAILROAD

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Mar. 6.—Re-organization of the Petaluma and Santa Rosa railway company with a direct service between San Francisco and Healdsburg is involved in a \$10,000,000 electric railroad deal which has reached a point where the company is ready to file corpora-

tion papers. The company, it was said today, is being financed by E. H. Hollins and Company, bond brokers who were the original backers of the Petaluma and Santa Rosa railroad.

The offer was received yesterday and read: "Accept my warmest congratulations on your wonderful victory. Will pay you \$500 a week to appear on the Orpheum stage for five minutes in a monologue at each performance."

Gill refused the offer in the following letter: "Thanks for your offer. I am informed that the Orpheum paid Sarah Bernhardt \$7000 a week with many accommodations, furberlows, presidential suites in addition. Being younger than the Divine Sarah, would not consider less than \$10,000 per week."
