CANAL TOLL CONTROVERSY

THE controversy over the repeal of exemption from canal tolls for American ships seems to a layman much ado about nothing.

The American people have the inherent right to make such rules governing their own property as they see fit. They are, of course, in honor bound to live up to treaty obligations, but it is a serious question whether the Hav-Panneeforte treaty really entails any such obligation as Saturday evening. The treaty physical instructor of the Sacraclause in question reads as follows:

The canal shall be free and open to the vessels of commerce and of war of all nations observing these rules, on terms of entire equality, so that there shall be no discrimination against any such nation, or its citizens or subjects, In respect of the conditions or charges of traffic, or otherwise. Such conditions and charges of traffic shall be just and equitable

Whether this means all nations, including our own, or all other nations, is the question in controversy and the in one hour to win, If he does not. treaty can be read either way.

It does not seem to be a very important contention, anyway, for if the exemption bill is repealed, its purpose. the encouragement of American shipping, can be served just as well by a subsidy equal to a remission of the tolls.

The favoritism toward American owned coastwise shipping does not particularly benefit the American nation. Such protection has built up the trusts. Monopoly always shows its patriotism by wrapping its sacred person with the flag to secure immunity and special privilege.

Few Americans are employed on these so-called American monopoly owned ships—the crews are mostly of alien races, and frequently the officers from foreign lands. At any rate, the issue is not worth an international disagree
