MR. OSCAR S. STRAUS WANTS COMMISSION TO INVESTIGATE CONDITIONS IN MEXICO

Mr. Oscar S. Straus proposes a new solution of the Mexican problem.

He suggests a special commission of Americans well acquainted with the problems of international law be sent to the sister republic to ascertain by investigation which party should be recognized by the United States. He believes that the United States must help Mexico put her house in order or let other Powers do it.

It will be of interest to the many persons who know of Mr. Straus' experience as a diplomatist to learn his views, which have been formulated after close study of the status in Mexico. He was formerly United States Minister to Turkey and also served as Secretary of Commerce and Labor. For years Mr. Straus has devoted much attention to the analysis of public questions.

COLQUITT READY TO DEFEND RANGERS

AUSTIN, Tex., March 10.—Governor Colquitt left here for Ft. Worth last night, declaring himself ready to defend the action of the Texas Rangers in connection with the Vergara case. He had received no request from Washington, however, for an explanation. Much curiosity was expressed concerning the nature of the Vergara report, said to have been telegraphed by United States Consul Garrett from Nuevo Laredo to Washington. His purport was not known here.

THIRTY INJURED IN STRIKE IN ROME

ROME, March 10.—Disorders incident to the general strike which began today were in progress last night. The city was in partial darkness as a majority of the electrical workers are striking. In conflicts between the strikers and troops and police 30 persons were injured. One hundred thousand workmen who started the general strike held a meeting today and adopted resolutions demanding the public hospitals' reorganization for the benefit of the working classes.

GENERAL VILLA DENIES THREATENING TERRAZAS

CHIHUAHUA CITY, Mex., March 10.—General Villa denied today that he ever threatened to take Luis Terrazas, Jr., upon the Torreón firing line. He admitted, however, that he had demanded the surrender of La Regina ranch, near Moqui, by General Snymman, an ex-lieutenant officer. Snymman, he asserted, does not own the ranch, but is holding it for the Creel family that it may escape confiscation.

FEDERAL VICTORY CLAIMED AT TORREON

EL PASO, Tex., March 10.—That the federals at Torreón defeated the rebels with heavy losses Sunday was asserted in mail advices received here today. Of the rebels it was said more than 1600 were killed, 480 were wounded and 190 were captured. Generals Arguendo and Pena were named as having commanded the federals and General Ortega as leading the rebels. The story was telegraphed to General Hilla, who denied that such a battle had taken place, saying Ortega was at Chihuahua City at the time for supplies.
