Mrs. F. H. Cowles and daughter Barbara have returned from Santa Barbara and Pasadena where they spent the winter and are staying at the Hotel Medford.

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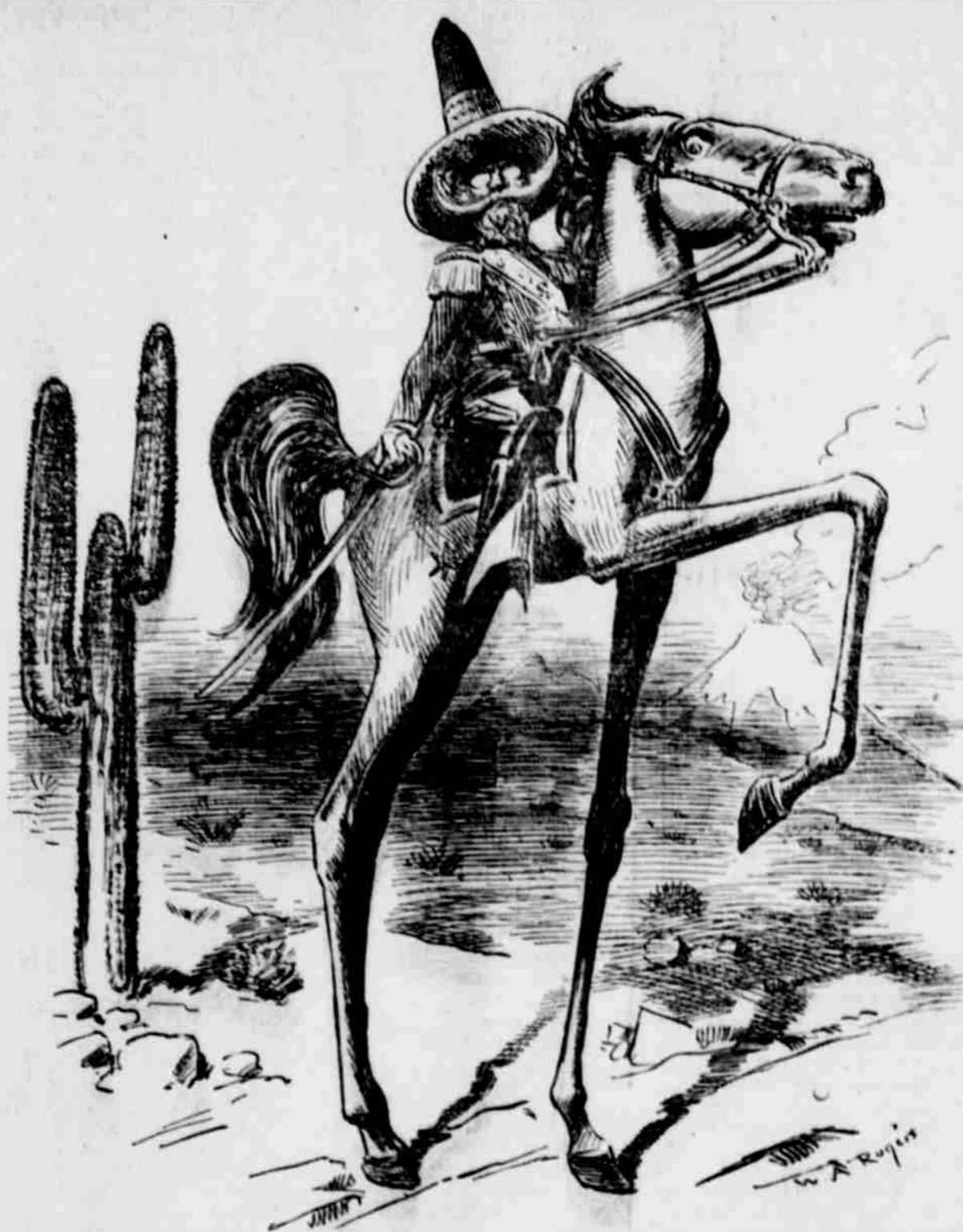

LAND GRANT LAND SALE TO INNOCENT PURCHASERS MADE

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 11.—More "innocent purchasers" are expected to come into United States court here within a few days, following the ruling of Judge R. S. Bean yesterday that 5,000 acres of richly timbered land in the Willamette valley, part of the Oregon California railroad land grant, purchased from the Southern Pacific company, should be forfeited to the government.

The Pillsbury Lumber company, a Minnesota corporation controlled by the flour millers' interests, owned 2,000 acres of this forfeited land, located in Douglas and Coos counties. The Forester Lumber company, an Oregon concern owned 1,500 acres in Clackamas county.

About 45 "innocent purchasers" have applied under the Hawley act, which allows them to buy back their holdings from the government at \$2.50 per acre within six months.

LONDON DAILY TIMES NOW A TWO-CENT PAPER

LONDON, March 11.—It was announced that beginning next Monday the price of the Times will be reduced from three pence to a penny (two cents).
