W. H. Canon of Medford, "the original Wilson man of Jackson county," is as yet the democrat who has filed his petition as candidate for the position of national committeeman. Mr. Canon is a guest at the Portland hotel today and in asoiring to this party honor he declares his confidence in the support of southern Oregon.

Mr. Canon has been a resident of Oregon for the past seven years and politics from the minute he struck the state. At the present time he is United States commissioner at Medford. He was mayor of that city for four years, and it was during his administration that the municipality underwent its greatest period of growth and upbuilding.

He has also been a member of the state committee since he became a voter in Oregon and is chairman of the democratic county committee of Jackson county.

Back in Wisconsin previous coming to Oregon he was United States marshal for the western district of that state under the Cleveland administration and head of the Wisconsin state land office under the administration of Governor Peck. He is an attorney by profession.

Although Mr. Canon is the only democrat who has filed his petition for national committeeman, Hugh McLain of Marshfield, has announced his intention of running for the position, while Will R. King, chief counsel for the United States reclamation service, the present incumbent will undoubtedly seek to sue ceed himself. Milton A. 
