

### BOTH PUGILISTS SURE OF WINNING MILWAUKEE FIGHT

CHICAGO, March 11.—Willie Ritchee packed up his training apparatus here this morning and prepared to leave this afternoon for Milwaukee, where tomorrow night he is scheduled to clash with Ad Wolgast in a ten-round no-decision affair. The champion was within one pound of the required 135 pounds when he arose today. He asserted the stipulated weight would be easy now.

Ritchee is in prime condition, and reports from Milwaukee say Wolgast is physically perfect except for a slight injury to his left hand. Odds on the bout lengthened today to 10 to 6 with Ritchee on the long end, and experts expected the champion to be a 2 to 1 ringside favorite.

Both fighters finished all real training yesterday. From now until the hour of battle they will take things easy, figuring only on a few minutes of road work to keep them on edge.

Physicians told Wolgast today that he had bruised a nerve in his left hand in one of the clashes with his sparring partners. Ad, however, showed but little concern over this, and was confident of victory.

### RICCARDI CAUGHT AT MONTE CARLO

PARIS, March 11.—The arrest of a man said to be C. V. Riccardi, wanted in Los Angeles, is reported, in connection with various alleged financial frauds and a redundancy of love affairs, was announced here today in a telegram from Monte Carlo.

The authorities of Monaco, it was stated, were holding the prisoner pending instructions from the United States. They were ready to turn him over on fulfillment of the necessary international formalities.

Whether or not he was likely to resist extradition the message did not say, but its tone indicated that so far as local officialdom was concerned there would be no objection to surrendering him.

Riccardi, if the prisoner really was he, was said to have been a passenger on the liner Franconia from New York, but just to have arrived in Monte Carlo. He was well supplied with money. How the Monte Carlo police recognized him was not explained.

### EXPEDITE ACTION ON TRUST BILLS

WASHINGTON, March 11.—House leaders promised President Wilson today that they would expedite action on proposed trust legislation.

The completed trade commission bill, as approved by Attorney General McReynolds, differs radically from the measure as originally drafted by Representative Clayton of Alabama. As the bill now stands, provision is made for only three commissioners with power only slightly amplified over that of the present commissioner of corporations. It was expected that the president would name Corporation Commissioner Davies a member of the trade commission.

### DIGGS AND CAMINETTI IN SUPREME COURT

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., March 11.—Federal Judge Dooling granted a writ of error and citation in the white slavery cases of Maury I. Diggs and F. Drew Caminetti, which officially brings the cases before the federal court of appeals.

### TITLE AWARDED TO HALF BILLION DOLLAR CLAIMS

SEATTLE, Wash., March 11.—Title to a coal claim near Glacier, Whatcom county, worth about \$500,000, was awarded yesterday by the United States land office at Seattle to six joint claimants, Mrs. Mary Wheatmar, Seattle; John P. Stuart, Blaine, Wash.; Harry C. Smith, Clarence C. Keplinger and Joseph M. Frankovitz, Bellingham, and Douglas H. Hinton, Glacier.

Each owns 100 acres of land, which is underlain with three great veins of anthracite coal. The land is located in the forest reserve about 140 miles from Seattle. The claims were filed in 1909. In 1911 the government brought action to annul the claims on the ground that the land was chiefly valuable for timber and not for coal. The final hearing came up yesterday.

Professor Henry Landes, state geologist, now president of the state university; F. H. Whitlock, consulting engineer, and Charles Newhall, efficiency engineer, all testified that the coal found was pure anthracite. It was estimated by them that each 100 acres was capable of producing more than \$86,000,000 of coal.

### CHINESE BANDITS KILL NORWEGIAN IN RAID, LAO HOKQW

PEKIN, Mar. 11.—That Dr. T. Froyland, a Norwegian missionary, was killed recent and much American and British property destroyed or stolen by bandits in a raid on Lao Hokow, Hupeh province, was the news brought here today by E. M. Sam also of the Norwegian mission who escaped and made his way in the face of great hardships and danger to the capital.

Besides Dr. Froyland many Chinese were killed. Among the buildings plundered and burned were those belonging to the Asiatic Petroleum company, the Singer Sewing Machine company and British and American Tobacco companies.

On leaving, the bandits forced 2000 coolies to accompany them, carrying their plunder.
