

## FAKE ORGANIZER OF OWLS PLEADS MEMORY LAPSE

J. K. Woods, organizer of the Im- proved Order of Owls, arrested the first of the week for alleged fraud in worthless checks, and other mat- ters, claims now that he suffered from a mental lapse the last two months, and has no clear and concise recollection of what he has been doing, according to a statement made to his wife, who is staying with friends in this city. The fraternal organizer, however, is fully cognizant of the painful fact that he is incarcerated in the county jail at Jacksonville, unable to get bail. Woods' defense may be based upon the mental lapse alibi.

New light on the methods of Woods developed yesterday, in se- curing members for the Owls. Out of 200 members, with an initiation fee of \$5 each, 123 paid. About 75 citizens were taken into the order to lend dignity. Mayor Mahlon Purdin and Amos Walker, Republican candidate for sheriff and others being on this list.

The district organizer of the Owls is expected to arrive on the scene next week, and attempt to straighten out the tangle. No further word has been heard from the grand lodge headquarters.

## WILLIAM NICKEL COMMITS SUICIDE

OREGON CITY, Or., March 13.—"Death by drowning with suicidal intent" is the verdict here today in the death of William Nickel of Milwaukee, whose body was found floating in Kellogg's lake yesterday. Nickel, whose health has been discouraging, left the barber shop where he was employed, about 10 o'clock and ap- pears to have walked direct to the lake.

J. T. Kannolds saw him in the wa- ter and called S. H. Borland, the two finally dragging Nickel to the bank. Dr. W. B. Taylor worked over him nearly two hours, but could not revive him. Nickel formerly resided at Medford, where his brother, Charles Nickel, formerly edited a newspaper.

The body was taken to the morgue at Oregon City, where it is held until the local authorities can receive word from relatives.

## DOUBLE TRAGEDY ENDS TRIAL MARRIAGE

SAN FRANCISCO, March 13.—James Bakus, a tailor, this after- noon shot and probably fatally wounded Miss Martha Boltze, 26 years old, and then turned the re- volver on himself. Both are in a critical condition at the central emergency hospital.

Earlier in the day Bakus and Miss Boltze engaged in a dispute over a trial marriage they had contracted several months ago. A month later she left town, and when she returned refused to live with him again. Bakus again called at the house shortly after noon and started shoot- ing when Miss Boltze refused to listen to his proposal that they be legally married.

## JAPANESE NAVAL BUDGET REDUCED TO \$45,000,000

TOKIO, March 13.—To the time of vehement protests from Premier Yamamoto, the upper house of the Japanese parliament today reduced the naval estimates from \$80,000,000 to \$45,000,000.

The government originally wanted \$95,000,000, but previous cutting had trimmed its figures by \$15,000,000. The next step will be the esti- mates' submission to a conference from representing both upper and lower houses. Indications were that they would go through in their latest form.

Should this happen, it was consid- ered certain that Premier Yamamoto would resign. In his argument he made repeated veiled references to his complications with a foreign power, and it was believed he had in mind the United States, since the new California anti-Japanese land law went into effect.

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## DROWN SPENDTHRIFT DECLARES LAWYER MANAGING ESTATE

OAKLAND, March 13.—John F. Leicester, refusing to answer a question put before District Attorney W. H. Hynes and declaring that the present trial of Mrs. Mildred Drown, the sister-in-law of his law partner, was improperly conducted, enveloped the twelfth day of the Drown murder trial here. Hynes had asked whether Leicester thought Mrs. Drown a raving maniac the early part of the evening of the tragedy. Leicester resented the tone more


than the words of the question, and calmly said: "I refuse to answer." It was not until Judge Ogden had intervened and the question was reframed that temporary peace was restored.

It was established after much wrangling that Archer Drown left two life insurance policies in favor of his wife, by which, if required, she would come into \$12,000 besides the income of \$100 a month left her under the will of Judge Drown, the advent of the Archers. If convicted this sum would revert to the Drown estate, going to Willard Drown and his two sisters.

Leicester said that \$405 a month

had been needed to. He main- tained that the dead man and him- self had always been the best of friends, although he had been the trustee from the death of the older Drown.

Leicester repeated many of the stories told him by Mrs. Drown concerning Marie Millar, who figured so largely in the tragedy.
