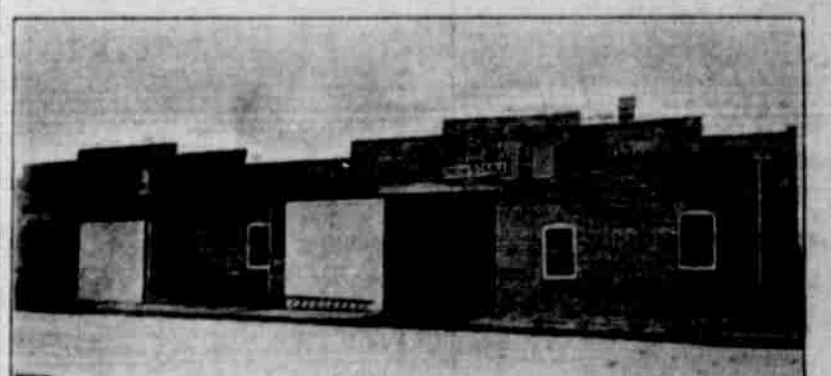

**MEXICAN FEDERALS GUESTS AT FORT BLISS**  
WASHINGTON, March 14.—The United States will continue to insist in obtaining information from General Carranza and the Mexican constitutionalists concerning all foreigners' welfare in Mexico and will not relax its energy in using its good offices for their protection. This is the effect of a communication from Secretary Bryan to American Consul Simpich at Nogales, who presented the information to Carranza. The reply was in Bryan's hands tonight but was not made public.  
Notice of habeas corpus proceedings to release the federal prisoners at Fort Bliss was telegraphed the war department by General Bliss. Secretary Garrison turned the dispatch over to Attorney General McReynolds who is expected to direct

the federal district attorney at Houston to represent the war department in opposing the writ on the ground of public policy and danger to El Paso from the presence of several thousand unsheltered Mexicans. The refugees are military prisoners held under provisions of international law.
