CHICAGO, March 20.—Fear of a riot caused the police to arrest Miss Ellen Gates Starr, one of the Hull House founders, on a charge of resisting an officer in connection with the arrest of pickets in the downtown restaurants strike according to police testimony in her trial today. Policeman Baldwin testified she interfered when he arrested two young women for picketing. Miss Starr denied she attempted to incite a riot saying she merely protested in a general way against the arrest she thought illegal.

MINE OPERATORS SUE UNIONISTS FOR MILLIONS DAMAGE

DENVER, Colo., March 20.—Alleging conspiracy and intimidation, the Colorado Fuel & Iron company filed suit in the district court here today for \$1,000,000 damages against national and state officers of the United Mine Workers of America. Three other suits, aggregating \$3,000,000, will be filed by the operators later.

The complaints were mailed from Trinidad last night and reached here today. They charge conspiracy to paralyze working conditions in the Colorado coal fields and aver that the operators have already lost millions of dollars as a direct result. The complaints also charge that labor leaders have been guilty of blackmail; that they have induced the miners to quit work, arranged riots, burned bridges and crippled business in numerous other ways.

The mineowners cite the Danbury hat case as a precedent for instituting the suit. Union leaders say they intend to offset the action by using the report of the congressional probes as a weapon of defense.
