

### 1500 ENJOY RIDE ON TROLLEY LINE ON SCENIC ROUTE

### FIFTEEN MEXICANS ARRESTED ON BORDER

WASHINGTON, Mar. 23.—General Bliss telegraphed to Secretary of War Garrison today that fifteen Mexicans had been arrested by border patrols trying to enter the United States at Zapata, Texas. Ten men said they were fleeing from Guerrero, on the Mexican side of the border opposite Zapata.  
From Admiral Fletcher a wireless message was received saying the situation at Tampico was unchanged.

### EGGS AND POULTRY CAN BE SHIPPED BY PARCEL POST

WASHINGTON, Mar. 23.—An order permitting the shipment of eggs, poultry, butter, vegetables and fruit by parcel post was signed today by Post Master General Burleson. The plan will be tried out first in Washington, Boston, Baltimore, Atlanta, Philadelphia, Detroit and San Francisco. Later if the arrangement proves satisfactory, it will be extended to all points.

Commenting this afternoon on the order, Mrs. Ellis Logan, president of the Federation of Women's clubs, in the district of Columbia said:

"The post master general's order has struck the high cost of living a terrific blow. It places housewives indirect communication with producers, eliminates troubles in marketing and reduces its cost."

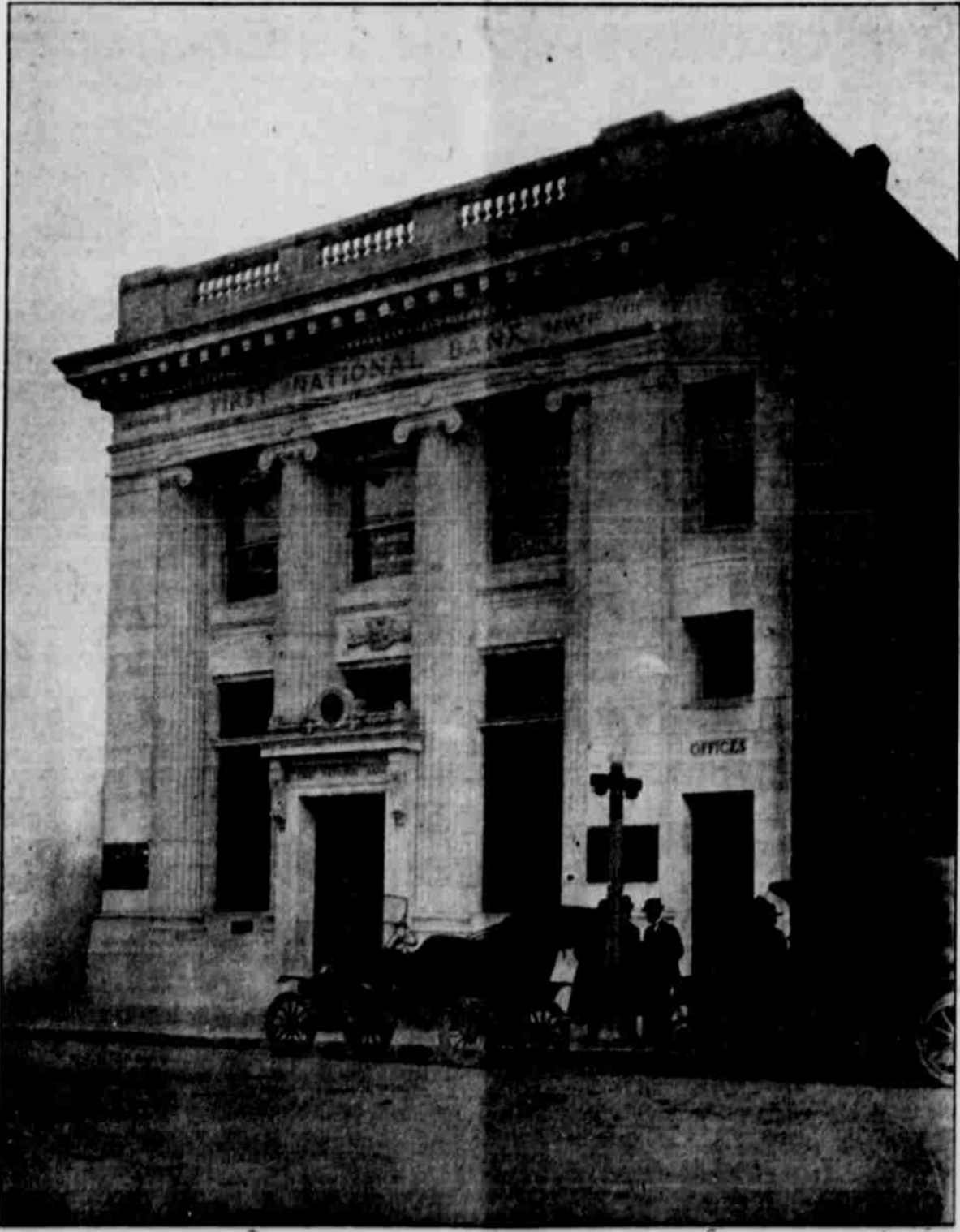
