

RURAL ROUTE 4 TO BE ESTABLISHED ON MAY FIRST

Through the assistance of Senator Chamberlain, the long-continued efforts of Postmaster Ralph Woodford to establish rural route No. 4 out of Medford have succeeded. The territory covered is that east and southeast of Medford from Hillcrest orchard to Phoenix. Delivery will begin May 1.

The following is the detailed description of the route:
