OPEN ALASKA COAL LANDS FOR ENTRY

WASHINGTON, Mar. 24.—The senate public lands committee agreed today upon a bill for the opening of Alaska coal lands under a leasing plan. The bill provides that 5120 acres in the Bering river district and 7680 acres in the Matanuska field will be reserved to be mined by the government when, in the opinion of the president, it becomes necessary as a result of an insufficient supply of coal.

The total average contiguous land which one person or corporation might hold is fixed at 2560 acres. It also provides that unreserved lands will be surveyed into 40 acre tracts or multiples thereof, the maximum being fixed at 560 acres for any tract. The bill also stipulates that no person or interest may hold an interest as a stockholder or otherwise in more than one lease.

FIAT MONEY CAUSE OF BUSINESS PANIC

DOUGLAS, Ariz., March 24.—Practically every wholesale mercantile house in the state of Sonora has discontinued business today because of the impossibility of doing business with fiat money. This money is valued at a gold ratio of five to one at present, but fluctuates to such an extent that no stable basis of value can be established.

AMERICAN SOLDIERS SHOOT AT MEXICANS

EAGLE PASS, Tex., March 24.—An official report on the firing across the Rio Grande Sunday by Mexican federalists was made here today by Captain George Winterburn of the fourteenth cavalry. He reported that two American soldiers had returned the fire after the federalists had refused to stop firing at rebel troops who had crossed the international border line into Texas. Captain Winterburn said he did not know whether any of the federalists were killed by the American soldiers.
