ORCHARDISTS NOW PURSUE POLICY OF WATCHFUL WAITING

Smudging activity throughout the valley Friday morning was on the decrease, though the orchardist assumed a "watchful waiting" policy for the coming of Jack Frost.

The temperatures of the orchards ranged from 36 to 39 degrees, with a predicted drop to 27 degrees, but increasing cloudiness and rising barometer, accompanied by a slight sprinkle in the south end of the valley modified the danger.

The reported temperatures were: Gould, 22; Halloway, 30; Griffin, 32; Barnum, 30; Carpenter, 32; Allen, 32; Bear creek, 32; Gold Range, 30; Bingham, 33; Piers, 33; Abercrombie, 31.

These reports came in from 4:40 to 5:15.

GOVERNOR THREATENS TROUTDALE SALOONS

SALEM, Ore., Mar. 27.—If the saloons of Troutdale do not live strictly within the law hereafter Governor West stated today he would close them up.

Complaints have been made to the governor about law violations at Troutdale, such as selling liquor to minors and the governor today addressed a letter to the mayor and council of that place advising them that they must see that the laws are enforced.

He also took the matter up with Sheriff Word of Multnomah county who has been active in rounding up such violators.
