However, he did not recommend this for Jackson county. He thinks we need shade trees. He spoke of a tree as somewhat resembling a human being. He said that to get the proper results in planting a tree a compass should be used, and that the tree should be planted with the side to the north that was originally north before it had been disturbed. He also gave several other rules regarding tree planting.
