

CALIFORNIA ASKS FOR HIGHWAY BIDS TO OREGON LINE

SACRAMENTO, Cal., March 28.—The state highway commission has called for bids, returnable in thirty days, for the construction of fifty miles of roadway in the upper Sacramento valley and canyon, as follows:

Siskiyou county, from Hornbrook to Oregon line, eight miles of grading.
Shasta county, from Lamoine to Hazelton, 9.9 miles of grading.
Tehama county, from southern boundary to Corning, 8.8 miles of oiled concrete.

To Oregon Line

Batte county, from Lindo channel to northern county boundary, 11.2 miles of oiled concrete.

Glenn county, Grapit to northern county boundary, 7 miles of oiled concrete.

Glenn county, Grapit to northern county boundary, 4.5 miles of oiled concrete.

This will carry the route to the Oregon line, the northern limit of contracts let at present being Marysville. Within the next two weeks the commission expects to call for bids aggregating ninety miles of construction. This will make a total of 550 miles of highway, ranging from the calling of bids to the actual construction.

The commission believes that all highways will be either under contract or in the course of construction by the opening of the 1915 fair. It has issued the following statement:

Build by Roads by 1915

"While the work of the commission has been set back fully a year by delay in financing bond sales, the general response of the last few months has relieved the situation greatly, so that if pledges made are fulfilled \$12,000,000 of the original bond issue will have been made available for construction within thirty days.

"Of this \$12,000,000 total, approximately \$7,000,000 has been sold, while \$3,000,000 more is to be sold at the end of this month, and there are pledges of \$2,000,000 more.

SERIOUS FLOODS IN NORTHERN NEW YORK

M'NARY CANDIDATE FOR RE-ELECTION TO SUPREME BENCH

Charles L. McNary, now a member of the supreme court of the state of Oregon, has announced his candidacy for the republican ticket for one of the positions on that tribunal, there being four justices to be nominated by the people in the May primaries. Born of pioneer parents forty years ago on a farm near Salem, compelled through circumstances to earn both his general and legal education, he has fought his way through the ranks of a legal profession to a jus-

tianship on the state's highest court and is a self-made man in the true sense of the word.

After acquiring his early education in the Salem public schools and his collegiate and legal education by supporting himself, he entered upon his profession with his brother, John H. McNary, in Salem more than fifteen years ago. By the unceasing labor of the two, the firm forged ahead until it became one of the recognized law firms of the state. For several years he served as assistant district attorney for the third judicial district, comprising the counties of Marion, Linn, Polk, Yamhill and Tillamook, and he won in the district the reputation of being a fearless, aggressive and capable prosecutor. For a number of years—in fact, until his accession to the supreme court, he was the dean of the Willamette College of Law, and made it one of the ranking colleges of the west. With his own struggles for an education still fresh in his mind, he made it a rule to deny no student an education because of the lack of money, and dozens of graduates of this college are today indebted to Justice McNary's personal generosity for their legal education.

Born and reared with the common class, he early learned to know the wants, needs and sufferings of the masses, and has always been a staunch champion of their cause. During his career as a justice of the supreme court he has written a number of important opinions, and they all breathe the spirit of the times—a spirit of progressiveness—and are an application of the science of law to present-day conditions instead of a blind adherence to technicalities.

ONE FARE RATE TO 1915 EXPOSITION FOR EASTERN CITIES

SAN FRANCISCO, March 28.—Exposition railroad rates fixed by the Transcontinental Passenger association are so low that they are calculated to attract an extraordinary number of easterners to California, and it has such a long return limit attached to it—three months—that of the host who come to see, it is believed a large proportion will remain to settle.

Low Round Trip Rate

The fares are round trip, with a return limit of ninety days, and are scheduled as follows: Missouri river points to California common points—that is, San Francisco, Oakland, Los Angeles and San Diego, \$50 (this is the lowest first-class fare one way at the present time); from St. Louis to California common points, \$57.50; Chicago, \$62.50; from Colorado common points—that is, Denver, Colorado Springs and Pueblo—\$45; Peoria, Ill., \$59.50.

The Missouri river points are Omaha, St. Joseph, Atchison and Kansas City. Other cities and towns lying in the vicinity of the above mentioned basic points will be given rates in proportion to their distances.

The exposition rate will be in effect from March 1, 1915, to November 30, 1915. The return limits will not extend longer than December 31, 1915, which will be after the close of the exposition.

Shasta Route Rate Added

For tickets reading one way to San Francisco through the North Pacific coast to such points as Victoria, Vancouver, Portland and Seattle, the Shasta route's usual arbitrary rate of \$15 or \$17.50 will be added to the round-trip ticket.

It now remains for the eastern passenger associations to fix the rates from the Atlantic seaboard to the middle continental points.

The rates fixed are less than one cent a mile on many of the routes. One of the factors figured on yesterday was the fact that business will move all in one direction—this is toward the west—for half of the year, and in the opposite direction the other half.
